Senate Budget Committee Follow Up Questions

Senator Stack:

Question: Please provide the committee with a county-by-county breakdown of FY 2009 federal Victim of Crime Assistance (VOCA) awards. Please specify the reductions from the FY 2008 budget to the FY 2009 VOCA awards.

Answer:

Below is a county allocation of the projected VOCA award for FFY 2008. The projected award amount for each county is based on anticipated federal funding for VOCA (FFY 2008). The federal appropriation for the VOCA program has been reduced dramatically; consequently, we anticipate that our federal VOCA award will be significantly reduced. While we have contacted each member of New Jersey's Congressional and Senate delegation, and the Attorney General has spoken about these cuts directly with President Bush, it does not appear that funding will be restored to previous levels.

The Department has not yet applied for or received the FFY 2008 VOCA award. As the FFY 2008 award amount has not yet been received, the projected amount for FFY 2009 cannot be made.

Senator O'Toole:

Question: As mentioned in the hearing, roughly \$20 million has been spent on outside counsel to oversee an average of 200 to 250 cases annually. Please provide, from FY 2005 forward, an annual breakdown, firm by firm, of cases that were retained and managed; please supply to the committee how much in aggregate was billed.

Answer:

Please see attached charts.

Senator Sweeney:

Question: In FY 2007 the Governor suggested that there would be a Rural Police State study. If that study has been completed, please provide the committee with a copy of that study.

Answer:

The Department is not aware of a FY 2007 study on State Police rural patrol. The Department of Treasury is currently working on a formula to implement this initiative.

Senator Oroho:

Question: The State Police brought in \$180 million in revenue from motor vehicle tickets and fines. Please provide details to the committee on how this revenue was allocated to the State, counties and municipalities.

Answer:

As outlined in N.J.S.A. 39:5-40:

Except as otherwise provided by this subtitle, all moneys received in accordance with the provisions of this Title, whether from fines, penalties, forfeitures, registration fees, license fees, or otherwise, shall be accounted for and forwarded to the commissioner, who shall pay the same over to the State Treasurer, to be credited to the State Highway Fund and used for the purposes of such fund as provided by section 52L22-20 of the Title, State Government, Departments and Officers.”

With the very few exceptions annunciated in N.J.S.A. 39:5-41, the fines collected from motor vehicle summonses issued by members of the State Police are forwarded to the Department of the Treasury. According to information obtained from the Judiciary, in the twelve-month period from March of 2007 through February of 2008, the State Treasurer collected \$32.767 million from fines associated with motor vehicle summonses issued by members of the State Police.

Senator Turner:

Question: Please provide the committee with the annual budgeted amount for the vendor, Morpho Systems, for fingerprinting services since FY 2006. Additionally, please provide information on the bidding process for this contract; was this contract competitively bid? If not, please provide the reasons behind the decision. Please note if there are, at present, other vendors that could supply this service to the State.

Answer:

There is no annual budgeted amount for this service contract. The vendor charges \$11.00 per applicant to provide the fingerprinting service. This \$11.00 fee must cover all of the vendor's costs (i.e., personnel, building rentals, equipment, phone lines, call center, on-line scheduling, and any other costs for providing this service). Unless provided otherwise by separate legislation, all costs for non-criminal justice fingerprint services are paid by the applicant.

The State contract was competitively bid. The State published a RFP and four vendors submitted bids for the contract. The bid opening was September 15,

2006. The evaluation committee, with representation from the State Purchase Bureau, reviewed each proposal and forwarded its recommendation of Sagem Morpho to the State Treasury for approval and processing of the award.

Sagem Morpho was awarded the State contract effective March 15, 2008. The RFP and contract are posted on the Department of the Treasury, Division of Purchase and Property website.

We note that no vendor appealed the award of the contract to Sagem Morpho.

Question: Committee members have received complaints from home improvement contractors regarding delays in licensing. Please provide to the committee an update regarding the licensing process and time-frame for this new professional board.

Answer:

Home improvement contractors are registered by the Regulated Business Section of the Office of Consumer Protection. It is not a professional board. The Division has received over 52,700 applications since registration began in 2006. The registration process is as follows:

Division personnel review every new application to verify that the applicant answered all questions and attached the correct corporate papers and proof of valid insurance. Information is then entered into a database for tracking purposes. The reviewing unit examines the application if (1) the applicant discloses a criminal history or a history of civil violations, or (2) if the applicant is a sole proprietor who discloses s/he is in arrears with child support or an education loan, is not an American citizen, or does not have the correct working papers.

If the application is otherwise complete, a further check determines whether the applicant is the subject of a current investigation or has any outstanding, unsatisfied consent orders. Once an application is approved, the file is sent to the NJ OIT Printing Hub for printing and mailing. It takes up to 10 business days from the time an application is approved to the time the paper registration form is received. Registered contractors may request a verification letter, permitting them to work until the actual registration is received.

Regarding the processing time, the Division processes all registrations in the order received. Processing time depends on the volume of applications received at any given time and whether the application is complete. If an

application is deficient, the applicant receives a deficiency letter and the Division does not process the application further until the applicant has addressed the deficiency. Almost two-thirds of applications received by the Division are deficient. At the present level of staffing, a complete application with no deficiencies can be processed, on an average, within 4-6 weeks. This would be under optimal conditions.

Question: Please provide the committee with the following information on community programs within the Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC):

Of the 30 JJC community programs, how many are residential programs and how many are day programs? Of these programs, how many are State programs versus contracted programs?

Answer:

Juvenile Justice Commission operates 13 residential programs, three Residential/Transitional Living programs, six Day Programs, five Drug Programs (operated by Division of Addiction Services), and ten Day Reporting Centers.

The State operates twelve of the thirteen residential programs. One program is a contracted program (Costello Prep). The State operates all six Day Programs. Of the 10 Day Reporting Centers, the State operates one Day Center, with the other nine operated via contract.

Question: The FY 2008 Governor's recommended budget estimated a per capita cost for JJC programs at \$80,535 and the FY 2009 recommended budget revises the FY 2008 calculation to \$109,004, an increase of 35 percent more per capita. Please provide the committee with information of how the office accounts for the increase in these estimates. Do these estimates include educational costs paid for the State Facilities Education Act (SFEA)? Do these cost estimates include fringe and other indirect costs for State employees? What is the real total cost per capita annually?

Answer:

The revisions in FY 2008 per capita costs, as reflected in the FY 2009 Governor's budget, reflects a change in the calculation methodology between the FY 2008 and the FY 2009 Governor's budget. The revised amount for FY 2008 is based on different fund sources than used in the original budget estimate, and thus cannot be used for a parallel comparison of the per capita cost for the two fiscal years. Using the original method from last year, the FY

2008 per capita revised annual cost is only \$75,796. These costs do not include State Facilities Education Act Entitlement dollars or fringe and other indirect costs.

SFEA costs per student will be \$28,950 beginning July 1, 2008 and the fringe benefit rate (33.15%) for salary costs, would add \$16,968 to the per capita. Again, neither of the per capita amounts include educational costs paid from the State Facilities Education Act (SFEA) or fringe and other indirect costs for State employees.

Question: Please provide an explanation to the committee of the variances in cost between community programs and secure institutional care.

Answer:

The FY 2009 Governor's budget for Secure Care Operations totals \$64,507,000, which consists of \$32,891,000 for the New Jersey Training and \$31,616,000 for the Johnstone Campus. The FY 2009 DSS Governor's budget for Juvenile Community Programs (with a portion of administrative costs) is \$31,981,000. This includes \$900,000 in Grants in Aid funding for the Day Reporting Program.

The cost variance primarily resides in the salary differences between custody supervision, required in our secure care facilities, versus non-custody supervision (youth workers) in our community programs, medical services and maintenance of the buildings and grounds at secure care facilities.

Question: Please provide the committee with the following information regarding secure care facility in the JJC:

The FY 2009 Governor's recommended budget combines the institutional operation budget data for Jamesburg, Bordentown and other secure facilities. Please provide the committee with a breakdown of the budget for these facilities.

Answer:

The FY 2009 Governor's Recommended budget for Secure Care Operations is \$64,507,000, which consists of \$32,891,000 for the New Jersey Training School and \$31,616,000 for the Johnstone Campus.

Question: The FY 2009 recommended budget estimates a per capita cost for JJC institutional facilities at \$101,069 annually. Do these estimates include educational costs paid for SFEA? Do these cost estimates include fringe for State employees or any other incurred costs? Commissioner Haymen in the Department of Corrections (DOC) estimated the per capita inmate costs at \$37,000 (\$47,000 including employee benefits). Please explain to the committee the variances in cost between JJC to DOC secure care facilities?

Answer:

The per capita estimates included in the Governor's FY 2009 budget do not include educational costs paid for by SFEA nor do they include fringe benefits for State employees. When comparing an average daily population of over 22,962 adult inmates (source – FY 2009 Governor's budget) to an average daily population of 538 juveniles (source – FY 2009 Governor's budget), the economies of scale are much greater in the Department of Corrections. Additionally, the Commission employs 452 custody officers, while Corrections employs approximately 6,300 custody officers. Two of the secure care facilities used by JJC have design and layout issues which do not lend themselves to efficient assignment of custody officers.

Question: Please provide the committee with the following information regarding education within JJC:

What is the per resident/student dollar amount received under SFEA? How much, or what percentage goes to cover administrative costs for your Office of Education, versus costs for books, teaching materials, teachers and other classroom-staff salaries? Is the State maximizing federal financial participation in these educational costs under IDEA and other federal funding sources?

Answer:

In FY 2009, the Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) will receive approximately \$22,750 per pupil for secure care residents and \$28,950 per pupil for community program residents under SFEA. Of the total \$30.5 million received under SFEA, JJC spends \$28.3 million on books, teaching materials, teachers, and other classroom staff salaries. The administrative cost will be approximately \$2.2 million in FY 2009.

JJC does receive funding from Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA) and other federal grants such as the Perkins Grant and "No Child Left Behind." Total funding from these federal grants amounts to \$1.8 million.

Question: Please provide the committee with the following information regarding medical care within the JJC:

Please supply information on the providers of medical, dental, pharmaceutical and mental health services to youth under the jurisdiction of JJC. What percentage of JJC students are classified as "special education" (emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted, etc.)? As mentioned in the hearing, UMDNJ provides mental health services to JJC residents. Please provide the committee with the amount of the UMDNJ contract and how it was contracted. Additionally, please provide your opinion on whether the State could receive equal or better services at a lower cost by going through a bidding process.

Answer:

Currently, in-house Commission staff supply medical care for secure care residents. Dental and pharmaceutical care are supplied via purchase bureau contracts with Correctional Dental Associates (Contract T-2306) and Omnicare (Contract T-0472). The University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey provides mental health services to JJC residents.

Forty-nine percent of JJC residents are classified as "special education".

The current FY 2008 contract with UMDNJ amounts to \$1.8 million for mental health services. Until 2004, JJC contracted with Correctional Medical Services for all secure care medical services. The contract was not renewed and JJC began negotiations with UMDNJ to handle all medical care for the secure care. Eventually, a decision was made that Commission would handle medical care in-house and UMDNJ would provide mental health services.

The Commission is always open to discussions regarding the competitive bidding process for medical, dental, pharmaceutical and mental health care for residents. These services are a key component to juvenile offenders' recovery and re-entry into their community.
