## SENATE, No. 1515 STATE OF NEW JERSEY 210th LEGISLATURE

## SYNOPSIS

Requires reporting by certain persons of attempted or completed suicides, establishes NJ Suicide Prevention Advisory Council; appropriates \$400,000.

## **CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT**

As introduced.



AN ACT concerning suicide, supplementing Title 30 of the Revised
 Statutes, repealing section 6 of P.L.1985, c.195, and making an
 appropriation.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. The Legislature finds and declares that:

9 a. Overall, suicide is the 11th leading cause of death for all 10 Americans and the third leading cause of death for young people ages 11 15 to 24. Suicide took the lives of 30,535 Americans in 1997. This 12 number is over 50% higher than the number of homicides reported 13 nationwide for that same year. Nearly 500,000 people require 14 emergency room treatment each year as a result of an attempted 15 suicide.

16 b. During the period from 1952 to 1995, the incidence of suicide 17 among adolescents and young adults nearly tripled. During the period 18 from 1980 to 1997, the rate of suicide among persons ages 15 to 19 19 increased by 11% and among persons ages 10 to 14 by 109%. 20 Although suicide among young children is a rare event, the dramatic 21 increase in the rate among persons ages 10 to 14 underscores the 22 urgent need for intensifying efforts to prevent suicide among persons 23 in this age group. It is also widely reported that the risk for attempted 24 or completed suicide varies with race, religion, age and sexual identity. 25 c. In 1996, 72 persons under the age of 25 committed suicide in 26 New Jersey, and every month at least 127 young people in this State attempt suicide. Over 40% of the suicide attempts of minors are 27 28 second or subsequent attempts. Non-fatal suicide attempts outnumber 29 suicide death and often result in significant medical and economic 30 costs, and in physical, emotional and psychological damage. Like 31 suicide deaths, however, suicide attempts are generally under-

32 reported.

33 d. It is estimated that fewer than 25% of suicide attempts are reported. When they are reported, the reaction often makes the person 34 less likely to seek further help. Suicide evokes complicated and 35 36 uncomfortable reactions that stigmatize the survivors and increase 37 their burden of hurt, isolation and secrecy. This secrecy also tends to diminish the accuracy and amount of information available about 38 39 persons who have attempted or completed suicides, which information 40 could help suicide prevention efforts.

e. Therefore, it is necessary to establish a program in this State to:
collect information about those who attempt suicide and improve the
information available to both professionals, who are in contact with
persons at risk of suicide, and individuals and families at risk; identify
and provide suitable intervention services to reduce the incidence of
suicide; and educate children and families at risk about the resources

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1 available for suicide prevention and intervention.

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3 2. As used in this act:

4 "Attempted suicide" means destructive behavior intended by the5 actor to result in the actor's harm or death.

6 "Certified Domestic Violence Specialist" means a person who has
7 fulfilled the requirements of certification as a Domestic Violence
8 Specialist established by the New Jersey Association of Domestic
9 Violence Professionals.

"Completed suicide" means a death that is known or reasonably
suspected to have resulted from an intentional act of the deceased,
regardless of whether it has been ruled a suicide by a medical
examiner.

14 "Council" means the New Jersey Suicide Prevention Advisory15 Council established pursuant to this act.

16 "Division" means the Division of Mental Health Services in the17 Department of Human Services.

"Substance abuse counselor" means a person who is certified by an
appropriate professional organization to provide substance abuse
counseling for the prevention of substance abuse, including alcohol
abuse.

22 "Teaching staff member" means a member of the professional staff 23 of any school district, regional board of education or the board of trustees of a charter school, or any board of education of a county 24 vocational school, who holds an office, position or employment of 25 such character that the qualifications for the office, position or 26 27 employment require the member to hold a valid and effective standard, provisional or emergency certificate, appropriate to the member's 28 29 office, position or employment, issued by the State Board of Examiners. Teaching staff member includes a school nurse and a 30 school athletic trainer. 31

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3. a. Any teaching staff member, who, as a result of information
obtained in the course of the person's employment, has reasonable
cause to suspect or believe that a student has attempted or completed
suicide, shall promptly report such information to the division in a
form and manner prescribed by the division.

b. A nonpublic school is encouraged to require any member of its
professional staff, who, as a result of information obtained in the
course of the person's employment, has reasonable cause to suspect or
believe that a student has attempted or completed suicide, to promptly
report such information to the division in a form and manner
prescribed by the division.

As used in this subsection, "nonpublic school" means an elementary
or secondary school within the State, other than a public school,
offering education in grades K-12 or any combination thereof, at

1 which a child may legally fulfill compulsory school attendance 2 requirements.

3 c. Any licensed psychologist, social worker, marriage and family 4 therapist, professional counselor, physician, physician assistant, or registered nurse or licensed practical nurse licensed in this State 5 6 pursuant to Title 45 of the Revised Statutes, who, as a result of 7 information obtained in the course of the person's employment, has 8 reasonable cause to suspect or believe that an individual has attempted 9 or completed suicide, shall promptly report such information to the 10 division in a form and manner prescribed by the division.

d. Any public health official, probation officer, employee of the 11 12 Superior Court, Chancery Division, Family Part, substance abuse 13 counselor, Certified Domestic Violence Specialist, or member of a professional group identified by the council as having a likelihood to 14 15 know about suicide attempts and deaths, who, as a result of information obtained in the course of the person's employment, has 16 17 reasonable cause to suspect or believe that an individual has attempted or completed suicide, is encouraged to promptly report such 18 19 information to the division in a form and manner prescribed by the 20 division.

e. The reporting form established by the division shall not require the reporter to identify the student or individual by name or other unique identifier, but may require that the reporter supply nonidentifying demographic information about the student or individual, other attempts made by the student or individual and the response or referral made to deal with the incident.

f. The reporting form shall be submitted to a designated employee
of the division with responsibility for compiling data from the reports.
Information contained in the reports shall not be considered a public
record, but the division may aggregate the data for the purpose of
preparing an annual report pursuant to section 6 of this act.

g. The division shall offer to provide persons who are required or
encouraged to report an attempted or completed suicide with current
information about public and private assistance available to survivors
and families of attempted and completed suicides and professionals
who deal with suicide.

h. The reporting of an attempted or completed suicide pursuant to
this section shall not replace or alter any other requirement of law or
professional standard or obligation that requires a person to evaluate
a death or report an attempted or completed suicide.

i. Any person who reports an attempted or completed suicide
pursuant to this act shall have immunity from any civil or criminal
liability on account of that report, unless the person has acted in bad
faith or with malicious purpose.

j. No provision of this act shall be deemed to require the disclosure
of, or penalize the failure to disclose, any information which would be
privileged pursuant to the provisions of sections 18 through 23,
inclusive, of P.L.1960, c.52 (C.2A:84A-18 through 2A:84A-23).

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6 4. There is established in the Department of Human Services the7 New Jersey Suicide Prevention Advisory Council.

8 a. The purpose of the council shall be to: examine existing needs 9 and services and make recommendations to the division for suicide 10 reporting, prevention and intervention, giving priority to 11 recommendations concerning prevention and education for children 12 and young adults; advise the division on the content of informational 13 materials to be made available to persons who report attempted or 14 completed suicides; and advise the division in the development of regulations required pursuant to this act. 15

16 b. The council shall consist of 17 members as follows:

(1) the Commissioners of Human Services, Health and Senior
Services, and Education, the executive director of the Juvenile Justice
Commission established pursuant to P.L.1995, c.284 (C.52:17B-169
et seq.) and the chairman of the Community Mental Health Citizens
Advisory Board established pursuant to P.L.1957, c.146 (C.30:9A-1
et seq.), or their designees, who shall serve ex officio;

(2) six public members appointed by the Governor, as follows: one
person who is a current member of a county mental health advisory
board, one person with personal or family experience with suicide, one
person who is a current or retired primary or secondary school
teacher, one person who is a current or former member of a local
board of education and two persons with professional experience in
the collection and reporting of social science data;

30 (3) three public members appointed by the President of the Senate,
31 no more than two of whom are members of the same political party,
32 who have volunteer or paid experience in the provision of services to
33 survivors of suicide or people at risk of attempting suicide; and

(4) three public members appointed by the Speaker of the General
Assembly, no more than two of whom are members of the same
political party, who each have knowledge of and interest in the
prevention of suicide and the provision of education about suicide to
high-risk populations, including children and young adults, senior
citizens and religious, racial, ethnic or sexual minorities.

40 c. The public members shall be appointed no later than 60 days after41 the date of enactment of this act.

d. The public members shall serve for a term of five years; but, of
the members first appointed, three shall serve for a term of two years,
three for a term of three years, three for a term of four years and three
for a term of five years. Members are eligible for reappointment upon
the expiration of their terms. Vacancies in the membership of the

1 council shall be filled in the same manner provided for the original 2 appointments. 3 e. The council shall organize as soon as practicable following the 4 appointment of its members and shall select a chairperson and vicechairperson from among the members. The chairperson shall appoint 5 6 a secretary who need not be a member of the council. 7 f. The public members shall serve without compensation, but shall 8 be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties and within the limits of funds available to the council. 9 10 g. The council shall be entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the services of the employees of any State, county or 11 municipal department, board, bureau, commission or agency as it may 12 13 require and as may be available to it for its purposes. 14 h. The Department of Human Services shall provide staff support 15 to the council. 16 17 5. The Commissioner of Human Services shall develop and publicize, in consultation with the council, a public awareness 18 campaign on suicide prevention and intervention, the goals of which 19 20 shall be to: 21 a. increase voluntary reporting of suicides and attempts at suicide 22 by professionals who are likely to know of suicides and attempts in the 23 course of their employment; b. increase referrals by these professionals to therapeutic services 24 25 available to people who contemplate or attempt suicide; 26 c. increase public awareness of the incidence and causes of suicide 27 attempts and decrease the stigma currently associated with depression 28 and suicide; and 29 d. encourage the use by families of short-term and long-term public 30 and private mental health services, as well as other services, to reduce 31 the incidence of attempted and completed suicides. 32 33 6. a. The division shall compile data about reported attempted and 34 completed suicides by youth in the State, without identifying any individuals involved. 35 b. The Commissioner of Human Services shall issue a report 36 37 annually to the council, the Governor and the Legislature containing 38 a summary of the data compiled by the division that includes aggregate 39 demographic information about youth who attempt or complete 40 suicide. The report shall include any recommendations for legislation 41 or regulatory changes that would aid in the collection of more accurate data or the provision of more effective suicide prevention and 42 43 intervention. 44 c. The commissioner shall provide specific findings about youth 45 suicides and attempts to the council, as soon as possible, to assist the

46 council in fulfilling its responsibility under this act to make

1 recommendations about suicide prevention and intervention within that 2 population. 3 4 The Commissioner of Human Services, pursuant to the 7. "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et 5 6 seq.), shall adopt regulations to carry out the purposes of this act. 7 8 8. Section 6 of P.L.1985, c.195 (C.30:9A-17) is repealed. 9 10 9. There is appropriated \$400,000 from the General Fund to the Department of Human Services to carry out the purposes of this act. 11 12 13 10. This act shall take effect immediately. 14 15 16 **STATEMENT** 17 This bill establishes a suicide prevention and reporting program in 18 the Division of Mental Health Services in the Department of Human 19 20 Services. The purpose of the program is to: collect information about 21 those who attempt suicide and improve the information available to 22 both professionals, who are in contact with persons at risk of suicide, 23 and individuals and families at risk; identify and provide suitable intervention services to reduce the incidence of suicide; and educate 24 children and families at risk about the resources available for suicide 25 26 prevention and intervention. 27 With respect to reporting suicide attempts or completed suicides, 28 the bill: 29 C requires any teaching staff member (in a public school), who, as a 30 result of information obtained in the course of the person's 31 employment, has reasonable cause to suspect or believe that a 32 student has attempted or completed suicide, to promptly report the 33 information to the Division of Mental Health Services. The bill also 34 encourages a nonpublic school to require any member of its 35 professional staff to make these reports; C requires any licensed psychologist, social worker, marriage and 36 37 family therapist, professional counselor, physician, physician 38 assistant, or registered or licensed practical nurse in this State, who, 39 as a result of information obtained in the course of the person's 40 employment, has reasonable cause to suspect or believe that a 41 person has attempted or completed suicide, to promptly report the information to the division; and 42 C encourages any public health official, probation officer, employee 43 44 of the Family Court, substance abuse counselor, Certified Domestic 45 Violence Specialist, or member of a professional group identified 46 by the New Jersey Suicide Prevention Advisory Council

(established in the bill) as having a likelihood to know about 1 2 suicide attempts and deaths, who, as a result of information 3 obtained in the course of the person's employment, has reasonable 4 cause to suspect or believe that a person has attempted or 5 completed suicide, to report the information to the division. 6 The reporting form established by the division, pursuant to this bill, 7 shall not require the reporter to identify the person by name or other 8 unique identifier, but may require that the reporter supply non-9 identifying demographic information about the person, other attempts 10 made by the person and the response or referral made to deal with the 11 incident. Also, the bill requires the division to offer to provide persons 12 who are required or encouraged to report an attempted or completed 13 suicide with current information about public and private assistance

available to survivors and families of attempted and completed suicidesand professionals who deal with suicide.

16 Any person who reports an attempted or completed suicide 17 pursuant to this bill shall have immunity from any civil or criminal 18 liability on account of that report, unless the person has acted in bad 19 faith or with malicious purpose.

20 The bill establishes a 17-member New Jersey Suicide Prevention 21 Advisory Council in the Department of Human Services. The purpose of the council is to: examine existing needs and services and make 22 23 recommendations to the division for suicide reporting, prevention and 24 intervention, giving priority to recommendations concerning 25 prevention and education for children and young adults; advise the 26 division on the content of informational materials to be made available 27 to persons who report attempted or completed suicides; and advise the 28 division in the development of regulations required pursuant to this 29 bill.

30 The members of the council shall include:

C the Commissioners of Human Services, Health and Senior Services,
and Education, the executive director of the Juvenile Justice
Commission and the chairman of the Community Mental Health
Citizens Advisory Board, or their designees, who shall serve ex
officio;
C six public members appointed by the Governor, as follows: one

person who is a current member of a county mental health advisory
board, one person with personal or family experience with suicide,
one person who is a current or retired primary or secondary school
teacher, one person who is a current or former member of a local
board of education and two persons with professional experience
in the collection and reporting of social science data;

43 C three public members appointed by the President of the Senate who
have volunteer or paid experience in the provision of services to
survivors of suicide or people at risk of attempting suicide; and

46 C three public members appointed by the Speaker of the General

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Assembly who each have knowledge of and interest in the
 prevention of suicide and the provision of education about suicide
 to high-risk populations, including children and young adults, senior
 citizens and religious, racial, ethnic or sexual minorities.
 The bill also directs the Commissioner of Human Services to
 develop and publicize, in consultation with the council, a public
 awareness campaign on suicide prevention and intervention, the goals

8 of which shall be to:

9 - increase voluntary reporting of suicides and attempts at suicide
10 by professionals who are likely to know of suicides and attempts in the
11 course of their employment;

increase referrals by these professionals to therapeutic servicesavailable to people who contemplate or attempt suicide;

- increase public awareness of the incidence and causes of suicide
attempts and decrease the stigma currently associated with depression
and suicide; and

- encourage the use by families of short-term and long-term public
and private mental health services, as well as other services, to reduce
the incidence of attempted and completed suicides.

20 The Division of Mental Health Services is directed to compile data 21 about reported attempted and completed suicides by youth in the 22 State, without identifying any individuals involved. The Commissioner 23 of Human Services is directed to issue a report annually to the council, 24 the Governor and the Legislature containing a summary of the data 25 compiled by the division that includes aggregate demographic 26 information about youth who attempt or complete suicide. The report 27 shall include any recommendations for legislation or regulatory 28 changes that would aid in the collection of more accurate data or the 29 provision of more effective suicide prevention and intervention.

The bill repeals N.J.S.A.30:9A-17, which established a Youth Suicide Prevention Advisory Council in 1985, because the work of

32 that council is completed.

33 Finally, the bill appropriates \$400,000 from the General Fund to the

34 Department of Human Services to carry out the purposes of the bill.
