SYNOPSIS

Requires DCA to establish procedures for inspection and abatement of mold hazards in residential buildings and school facilities, and certification programs for mold inspectors and mold hazard abatement workers.

1 AN ACT concerning mold inspection and mold hazard abatement,
2 and supplementing Title 52 of the Revised Statutes.

4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
5 of New Jersey:

7 1. As used in this act:

8 "Department" means the Department of Community Affairs.

9 "District" means a local or regional school district established
10 pursuant to chapter 8 or chapter 13 of Title 18A of the New Jersey
11 Statutes, a county special services school district established
12 pursuant to article 8 of chapter 46 of Title 18A of the New Jersey
13 Statutes, a county vocational school district established pursuant to
14 article 3 of chapter 54 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes, an
15 educational services commission, a jointure commission or board,
16 and a commission under the authority of the Commissioner of
17 Education or the State Board of Education.

18 "Mold" means any form of multicellular fungi that lives on plant
19 or animal matter and in indoor environments. Types of mold
20 include, but are not limited to, Cladosporium, Penicillium,
21 Alternaria, Aspergillus, Fuarim, Trichoderma, Memnoniella, Mucor
22 and Stachhybotrys Chartarum, often found in water-damaged
23 building materials.

24 "School facility" means and includes any structure, building or
25 facility used wholly or in part for educational purposes by a district
26 or a charter school.

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28 2. a. Within six months after the effective date of this act, the
29 Department of Community Affairs, in consultation with the
30 Department of Health and the Department of Labor and Workforce
31 Development, shall adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the
32 "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et
33 seq.), that establish procedures for the inspection, identification,
34 and evaluation of the interior of residential buildings and school
35 facilities for mold based upon, but not limited to, industry standards
36 and standards and guidelines developed by the United States
37 Environmental Protection Agency.

38 b. Within six months after the effective date of this act, the
39 Department of Community Affairs shall adopt rules and regulations
40 pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act" that establish
41 procedures for mold hazard abatement including specialized
42 cleaning, repairs, maintenance, painting, temporary containment
43 and ongoing monitoring of mold hazards or potential hazards.
44 Hazard abatement procedures for mold developed by the department
45 shall:

46 (1) provide practical guidelines for the removal of mold and
47 abatement of the underlying cause of mold and associated water
48 intrusion and water damage in indoor environments; and

1 (2) provide practical guidance for the removal or cleaning of
2 contaminated materials in a manner that protects the health of the
3 person performing the hazard abatement, including requirements for
4 the use of protective clothing or equipment.

5
6 3. a. Within 12 months after the effective date of this act, the
7 Department of Community Affairs shall adopt rules and regulations
8 pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410
9 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), to establish a program for the certification of
10 persons who inspect for the presence of mold hazards in residential
11 buildings and school facilities. The mold inspection certification
12 program shall require that inspectors for mold hazards have training
13 and education in at least the following subject areas:

14 (1) proper methods to identify the presence of mold consistent
15 with the procedures developed therefor pursuant to subsection a. of
16 section 2 of this act;

17 (2) scientifically recognized procedures and new technologies
18 for the collection of air and surface samples;

19 (3) methods for the identification of locations of moisture
20 infiltration to locate likely areas for mold infestation;

21 (4) all applicable State and federal laws, rules and regulations;
22 and

23 (5) any other area the department deems relevant.

24 b. Within 12 months after the effective date of this act, the
25 department shall adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the
26 "Administrative Procedure Act" to establish a program for the
27 certification of persons who perform mold hazard abatement work,
28 and who safeguard buildings from the presence of mold in
29 residential buildings and school facilities. The mold hazard
30 abatement certification shall require that persons have training and
31 education in the following areas:

32 (1) mold hazard abatement procedures developed by the
33 department pursuant to subsection b. of section 2 of this act;

34 (2) specialized cleaning, repairs, maintenance, painting,
35 temporary containment and ongoing monitoring of mold hazards or
36 potential hazards;

37 (3) removal of mold and the abatement of the underlying cause
38 of mold and associated water intrusion and water damage in indoor
39 environments;

40 (4) removal or cleaning of contaminated materials in a manner
41 that protects the health of the person performing the mold hazard
42 abatement, including requirements for the use of protective clothing
43 or equipment;

44 (5) all applicable State and federal laws, rules and regulations;
45 and

46 (6) any other training or education the department deems
47 appropriate, including but not limited to the successful completion
48 of an outreach training program for the construction industry or

1 general industry that has been approved by the federal Occupational
2 Safety and Health Administration in the United States Department
3 of Labor as an orientation to the occupational safety and health of
4 workers covered by part 1926 of title 29, Code of Federal
5 Regulations.

6 c. In establishing the certification programs for mold
7 inspection and mold hazard abatement required pursuant to
8 subsections a. and b. of this section, the Department of Community
9 Affairs may:

10 (1) charge an annual fee for any persons certified pursuant to
11 subsection a. or b. of this section;

12 (2) require the successful completion of a course of continuing
13 education or training for certified inspectors or abatement workers
14 at least once every two years;

15 (3) conduct examinations to determine whether an applicant has
16 sufficient knowledge of the State and federal laws, rules and
17 regulations, and any standards or requirements, applicable to the
18 inspection or abatement of mold hazards, as the case may be; and

19 (4) adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the "Administrative
20 Procedure Act" to provide for:

21 (a) the enforcement and compliance with the mold inspection
22 and mold hazard abatement certification programs established
23 pursuant to subsections a. and b. of this section, which may provide
24 for the suspension, revocation, or refusal to issue or renew a
25 certification issued to persons by the department; and

26 (b) the imposition of penalties on any person who (i) violates
27 any provision of the certification programs established pursuant to
28 subsections a. and b. of this section, or (ii) inspects residential
29 building interiors or school facilities for the presence of mold or
30 performs mold hazard abatement work in residential buildings or
31 school facilities in violation of section 4 of this act.

32 d. In establishing the certification programs for mold
33 inspection and mold hazard abatement required pursuant to
34 subsections a. and b. of this section, the Department of Community
35 Affairs may grant a certification to a person who demonstrates to
36 the department that the person has successfully completed an
37 accredited program in mold inspection or mold hazard abatement,
38 as the case may be, by a nationally accepted accreditation
39 organization which is determined by the department to be equal to
40 or greater than the level of training and education required of
41 persons certified pursuant to subsection a. or b. of this section,
42 respectively; provided however, that a person granted a certification
43 pursuant to this subsection shall be required to pay the appropriate
44 annual fee charged by the department pursuant to paragraph (1) of
45 subsection c. of this section, successfully complete any course of
46 continuing education and training for certified inspectors or
47 abatement workers required by the department pursuant to
48 paragraph (2) of subsection c. of this section, and be subject to any

1 rules and regulations adopted pursuant to paragraph (4) of
2 subsection c. of this section.

3 e. An employee engaged in routine maintenance of a multiple
4 dwelling owned or managed by their employer shall not be required
5 to complete the certification programs established pursuant to this
6 section in order to address the presence of mold in the multiple
7 dwelling owned or managed by their employer; however, nothing in
8 this subsection shall be construed to exempt multiple dwellings
9 from otherwise complying with the procedures adopted by the
10 Department of Community Affairs pursuant to section 2 of this act.

11 f. A residential property owner shall not be required to
12 complete the certification programs established pursuant to this
13 section in order to perform mold inspection or mold abatement
14 work on his own property.

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16 4. On the first day of the sixth month following adoption of the
17 rules and regulations required pursuant to section 3 of this act:

18 a. Any person who inspects a residential building interior or a
19 school facility for the presence of mold shall be certified by the
20 Department of Community Affairs pursuant to subsection a. of
21 section 3 of this act.

22 b. Any person who performs mold hazard abatement work in a
23 residential building or a school facility, except as otherwise
24 provided in subsections e. and f. of section 3 of this act, shall be
25 certified by the department pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of
26 this act.

27 c. No person shall present himself to the public as an expert in
28 mold inspection or mold hazard abatement work unless certified by
29 the Department of Community Affairs pursuant to subsection a., b.,
30 or d., as applicable, of section 3 of this act.

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32 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

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STATEMENT

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37 This bill provides for the establishment of certain procedures for
38 the inspection for, and abatement of, mold hazards in residential
39 buildings and school facilities, and provides for the establishment of
40 programs to certify mold inspectors and mold hazard abatement
41 workers.

42 The bill requires the Department of Community Affairs (DCA),
43 in consultation with the Department of Health and the Department
44 of Labor and Workforce Development, to adopt, within six months
45 of the effective date of the bill, rules and regulations that establish
46 procedures for the inspection, identification, and evaluation of the
47 interior of residential buildings and school facilities for mold.
48 Further, the bill requires the DCA to adopt, within six months of the

1 effective date of the bill, rules and regulations that establish mold
2 hazard abatement procedures including specialized cleaning,
3 repairs, maintenance, painting, temporary containment, and ongoing
4 monitoring of mold hazards or potential hazards.

5 The bill requires the DCA to adopt, within 12 months of the
6 effective date of the bill, rules and regulations to establish a
7 certification program for persons who inspect for the presence of
8 mold hazards in residential buildings and school facilities. The bill
9 also requires the DCA to adopt, within 12 months of the effective
10 date of the bill, rules and regulations to establish a certification
11 program for persons who perform mold hazard abatement work in
12 residential buildings and school facilities.

13 The bill authorizes the DCA to charge an annual fee for the
14 certification of persons who inspect for the presence of mold and
15 perform mold hazard abatement, require the successful completion
16 of a course of continuing education or training for certified
17 inspectors or abatement workers at least once every two years,
18 conduct examinations to determine an applicant's proficiency with
19 respect to State and federal laws, rules, and regulations and any
20 standards or requirements applicable to the inspection or abatement
21 of mold hazards, and adopt rules and regulations to provide for the
22 enforcement of, and compliance with, the mold inspection and mold
23 hazard abatement certification programs established by the bill.

24 The bill authorizes the DCA to also grant mold inspection and
25 mold hazard abatement certifications to persons who are able to
26 demonstrate that they have successfully completed an accredited
27 program in mold inspection and mold hazard abatement by a
28 nationally accepted accreditation organization. The bill provides
29 that the accredited program must require persons enrolled in the
30 program to have training and education that is determined by the
31 department to be equal to or greater than the level of training and
32 education required of persons who are otherwise certified by the
33 department, that persons granted certification as a result of the
34 successful completion of an accredited program pay the appropriate
35 annual fee charged by the department, complete any course of
36 continuing education and training for certified inspectors or
37 abatement workers required by the department, and be subject to
38 any other rules and regulations adopted by the department.

39 The bill provides that on the first day of the sixth month
40 following the adoption of rules and regulations concerning the
41 establishment of programs to certify mold inspectors and mold
42 hazard abatement workers, any person who inspects for the
43 presence of mold hazards in residential buildings and school
44 facilities and any person who performs mold hazard abatement
45 work in those buildings must be certified by the DCA. The bill
46 allows only certified contractors to represent themselves to the
47 public as experts in mold inspection or mold hazard abatement, as
48 applicable.

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1 The bill provides that an employee engaged in routine
2 maintenance of a multiple dwelling owned or managed by their
3 employer will not be required to complete the certification program
4 for mold inspectors or mold hazard abatement workers to address
5 the presence of mold in the multiple dwelling owned or managed by
6 their employer.
