SYNOPSIS

Applies to Congress for limited constitutional convention to limit corrupting influence of money in politics and overturn Citizens United decision and related cases.

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1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION applying to the Congress of the 2 United States for the calling of a convention for the limited 3 purpose of addressing concerns raised by the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the case of Citizens United v. 4 5 Federal Elections Commission and related cases. 6 7 WHEREAS, Elections should be free of the corrupting influence of 8 excessive spending by outside interests and fair enough that any 9 citizen can run for public office; and 10 WHEREAS, Numerous United States Supreme Court decisions have 11 frustrated the will of the American people by eroding our ability to 12 choose our political leadership, write our laws, and determine the 13 fate of our country; and 14 WHEREAS, The New Jersey General Assembly and the New Jersey 15 State Senate passed Assembly Resolution No. 86 and Senate 16 Resolution No. 47, respectively, in the 2012-2013 legislative 17 session: and 18 WHEREAS, Those resolutions expressed the Legislature's "strong 19 opposition to [the] U.S. Supreme Court decision in Citizens United 20 v. Federal Elections Commission [and called] upon [the] Congress of the United States to propose amending [the] U.S. Constitution" 21 22 to overturn that decision; and 23 WHEREAS, Congress has failed to propose, pursuant to Article V of 24 the United States Constitution, amendments thereto that would 25 adequately address the concerns expressed in Assembly Resolution 26 No. 86 and Senate Resolution No. 47; and WHEREAS, Article V of the United States Constitution also requires 27 Congress to call a convention for proposing amendments thereto 28 29 upon application by two-thirds of the legislatures of the several 30 states; and 31 WHEREAS, The State of New Jersey believes that there is a great need 32 for a convention to propose amendments to the Constitution to 33 address the concerns raised by citizens opposed to the decision of 34 the Supreme Court in Citizens United and related cases, and 35 believes that such a convention must be limited solely, specifically, and exclusively to addressing those concerns; and 36 37 WHEREAS, The State of New Jersey believes that the delegates to such 38 a convention should be selected equally from individuals currently 39 holding State or local office, or selected by election from each 40 Congressional district for the purpose of serving as delegates, though past or present holders of federal elective office should be 41 42 prohibited from serving as convention delegates, and the State 43 should retain the ability to restrict or expand the power of its 44 delegates within the limits noted above; and WHEREAS, The State of New Jersey intends that this be a 45 continuing application considered together with all other 46 applications calling for a convention currently pending in other 47 48 state legislatures, and all other passed, pending, and future

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applications with the aforementioned concerns until two-thirds of
 the several states have applied for a convention and it is
 convened by Congress; now, therefore,

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BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

- 8 1. The Legislature of the State of New Jersey makes 9 application to the Congress of the United States for a convention to 10 be called under Article V of the Constitution of the United States of 11 America for the sole, specific and exclusive purpose of proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States that would 12 limit the corrupting influence of money in our political system 13 14 including overturning the decision of the United States Supreme 15 Court in the case of Citizens United v. Federal Elections 16 *Commission* and related cases.
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18 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State, 19 shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly or the 20 Secretary of the Senate to the President and Vice President of the United States, the Speaker of the United States House of 21 22 Representatives, the Minority Leader of the United States House of 23 Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the United States 24 Senate, each Senator and Representative from New Jersey in the 25 Congress of the United States, the Archivist of the United States and the respective clerks of the United States House of 26 27 Representatives and the United States Senate requesting that they record this application in the published tally of state petitions for a 28 29 convention of the states under Article V of the United States 30 Constitution, the Governor of each state, and the presiding officer 31 of each house of each state legislature in the United States.

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STATEMENT

36 This concurrent resolution makes application to the Congress of 37 the United States of America for a convention to be called under 38 Article V of the Constitution of the United States for the sole, 39 specific and exclusive purpose of proposing amendments to the 40 Constitution of the United States that would limit the corrupting 41 influence of money in our political system including by overturning 42 the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the case of 43 Citizens United v. Federal Elections Commission and related cases. 44 The resolution provides that copies of the resolution are to be 45 transmitted by the Secretary of the Senate to the President and Vice
