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23	STATEMENT
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25	This bill requires each school district to incorporate instruction
26	on water safety into the health education curriculum for students in
27	grades K through 12 as part of the district's implementation of the
28	New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Comprehensive Health
29	and Physical Education, beginning with the 2018-2019 school year.
30	The instruction must provide information on: the proper use of
31	flotation devices; how to become aware of water conditions; the
32	danger of rip currents and how to respond if caught in one; and the
33	importance of swimming in areas monitored by a lifeguard.
34	Drownings are the fifth leading cause of accidental death in the
35	United States according to the Centers for Disease Control. While
36	New Jersey students participate in drills for fire and active shooter
37	crises, they do not receive instruction on what to do if you are
38	drowning or see someone drowning.
