SYNOPSIS

Requires restaurants to post DOH sign concerning food allergen awareness in kitchen or staff area.

CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT

Introduced Pending Technical Review by Legislative Counsel.



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1 AN ACT concerning food allergy signs in restaurants and amending 2 P.L.2005, c.26. 3 4 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. Section 1 of P.L.2005, c.26 (C.26:3E-14) is amended to read 8 as follows: 9 1. The Commissioner of Health, in consultation with the New 10 Jersey Restaurant Association, shall prepare a fact sheet, to be directed to restaurant managers and staff, which is designed to 11 12 explain nut allergies and the health-related consequences to persons 13 with nut allergies who are exposed to food items that contain or are 14 prepared with nut products, and includes a recommendation that 15 restaurants identify such food items on their menus. The commissioner shall make this fact sheet available to local boards of 16 17 health by electronic or other means of distribution, and local health 18 officers shall furnish this information to restaurants at the time of 19 inspection. 20 In addition the commissioner, in consultation with the New 21 Jersey Restaurant Association and in consideration of food allergy 22 information published by the federal Food and Drug 23 Administration, shall prepare an informational sign promoting food 24 allergen awareness, which shall include information about the most 25 common food allergens, the health-related consequences of allergic 26 reactions to food, best practices for food storage and preparation to 27 prevent cross-contamination with food allergens, the symptoms of 28 and appropriate responses to an allergic reaction to food, and such 29 other information as the commissioner deems appropriate. The 30 commissioner shall make the food allergen awareness sign available 31 to restaurants and local boards of health, and each restaurant in the 32 State shall acquire a food allergen awareness sign and prominently 33 display the sign in the restaurant kitchen or another area of the 34 restaurant that is frequently used by, and is generally accessible to, 35 restaurant staff. In the case of restaurants in operation on the date 36 the sign is first made available, the restaurant shall acquire and 37 display the sign no later than one month after it is made available; 38 in the case of restaurants that commence operations after the sign is 39 made available, the restaurant shall acquire and display the sign as a 40 condition of commencing restaurant operations. 41 As used in this section: 42 "Nut" means peanuts and tree nuts, including, but not limited to, 43 almonds, brazil nuts, cashews, hazelnuts, filberts, macadamia nuts, pecans, pistachios, and walnuts; and 44

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"Restaurant" means an establishment in which the principal
business is the sale of food for consumption on the premises.

This act shall take effect on the first day of the fourth month 6 next following the date of enactment, except that the Commissioner 7 of health may take any administrative action in advance thereof as 8 may be necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

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STATEMENT

13 This bill requires the Commissioner of Health to develop, in consultation with the New Jersey Restaurant Association and in 14 15 consideration of food allergy information published by the federal 16 Food and Drug Administration, an informational sign promoting 17 food allergen awareness. The sign is to include information about 18 the most common food allergens, the health-related consequences 19 of allergic reactions to food, best practices for food storage and 20 preparation to prevent cross-contamination with food allergens, the symptoms of and appropriate responses to an allergic reaction to 21 22 food, and such other information as the commissioner deems 23 appropriate.

24 The commissioner is to make the food allergen awareness sign 25 available to restaurants and local boards of health, and restaurants 26 will be required to obtain and prominently display the sign in the 27 restaurant kitchen or another appropriate staff area no later than one month after the sign is made available or, in the case of restaurants 28 29 that commence operations after the sign is made available, the 30 restaurant is to acquire and display the sign as a condition of 31 commencing restaurant operations.

32 Exposure to food allergens, including milk, eggs, tree nuts, fish, 33 shellfish, peanuts, wheat, and soybeans, can cause a range of 34 symptoms in people with a sensitivity to the allergen, including 35 hives, rashes, coughing, tingling or itchy sensations, digestive 36 problems, and, in more severe cases, difficulty breathing, loss of 37 consciousness, or death. Without prompt treatment, seemingly mild 38 symptoms can quickly worsen, potentially necessitating hospital 39 care. Greater awareness of the risks posed by food allergens among 40 restaurant staff may help prevent accidental exposures to food 41 allergens and prepare staff to respond appropriately in the event a 42 restaurant patron exhibits the symptoms of an allergic reaction to 43 food.
