1 AN ACT concerning cyber-harassment and amending P.L.2013, 2 c.272. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. Section 1 of P.L.2013, c.272 (C.2C:33-4.1) is amended to 8 read as follows: 9 1. a. A person commits the crime of cyber-harassment if, while 10 making a communication in an online capacity via any electronic 11 device or through a social networking site and with the purpose to 12 harass another, the person: 13 (1) threatens to inflict injury or physical harm to any person or 14 the property of any person; 15 (2) knowingly sends, posts, comments, requests, suggests, or 16 proposes any lewd, indecent, or obscene material to or about a 17 person with the intent to emotionally harm a reasonable person or place a reasonable person in fear of physical or emotional harm to 18 19 his person; or 20 (3) threatens to commit any crime against the person or the 21 person's property. 22 b. Cyber-harassment is a crime of the fourth degree, unless the 23 person is 21 years of age or older at the time of the offense and 24 impersonates a minor for the purpose of cyber-harassing a minor, in 25 which case it is a crime of the third degree. 26 If a minor under the age of 16 is adjudicated delinquent for c. 27 cyber-harassment, the court may order as a condition of the 28 sentence that the minor, accompanied by a parent or guardian, 29 complete, in a satisfactory manner, one or both of the following: 30 (1) a class or training program intended to reduce the tendency 31 toward cyber-harassment behavior; or 32 (2) a class or training program intended to bring awareness to 33 the dangers associated with cyber-harassment. 34 d. A parent or guardian who fails to comply with a condition imposed by the court pursuant to subsection c. of this section is a 35 disorderly person and shall be fined not more than \$25 for a first 36 37 offense and not more than \$100 for each subsequent offense. 38 e. Cyber-harassment is a crime of the fourth degree if, with the 39 purpose to harass another and in a manner likely to cause 40 annoyance or alarm, a person tampers or interferes with, any 41 software, computer, cell phone or any other electronic device. As 42 used in this subsection, an "electronic device" includes but is not 43 limited to, a smart home device or system, home security system, 44 computer, digital camera, wireless or portable equipment, 45 entertainment systems or any other device that is capable of

8	STATEMENT

10	This bill would expand the crime of cyber-harassment to include
11	tampering or interfering with smart technology for the purpose of
12	harassing another person. Under the bill, cyber-harassment is a
13	crime of the fourth degree if, with the purpose to harass another and
14	in a manner likely to cause annoyance or alarm, a person tampers or
15	interferes with, any software, computer, cell phone or any other
16	electronic device. The bill defines, an "electronic device" includes
17	but is not limited to, a smart home device or system, home security
18	system, computer, digital camera, wireless or portable equipment,
19	entertainment systems or any other device that is capable of
20	transmitting, receiving, or recording messages, images, sounds,
21	data, or other information by electronic means.
22	It is the sponsor's belief that expanding cyber-harassment to
23	include smart technology for the purpose of harassing another
24	person, addresses the alarming trend where an offender uses smart
25	technology as a means to harass another person. Moreover, since
26	cyber-harassment is a predicate offense for domestic violence under
27	N.J.S.A.2C:25-19, this bill would encompass this new pattern of
28	behavior which is being seen in some domestic abuse situations
29	where Internet connected locks, thermostats, lights, speakers and
30	cameras are used to harass another person.
