Authorizes board of education to lease certain property.

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AN ACT concerning the leasing of school property and
 supplementing chapter 20 of Title 18A of the New Jersey
 Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. a. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 1 of P.L.1978, 8 9 c.91 (C.18A:20-8.2) or any other section of law to the contrary, and 10 except as otherwise provided pursuant to section 14 of P.L.2007, 11 c.137 (C.18A:7G-45), whenever any board of education shall by 12 resolution determine that any tract of land, whether there is a 13 building thereon or not, is not necessary for school purposes, but 14 which it does not desire to dispose of, the board may authorize the 15 lease thereof for a term extending beyond the official life of the 16 board, but which does not exceed any limit on the maximum term of 17 a lease that may be established pursuant to law for lease agreements 18 entered into by public entities; provided that the board awards the 19 lease to the highest bidder after advertisement of the request for 20 bids to lease in a newspaper published in the school district, or if 21 none is published therein, then in a newspaper circulating in the 22 district, a least once a week for two weeks prior to the date fixed for 23 the receipt and opening of bids.

b. In the event that a board of education leases a tract of land pursuant to subsection a. of this section, on which there is situated a school building, the terms of the lease may authorize the lessee to demolish the school building and to compensate the school district for the value of the school building in accordance with any terms that may be included in the lease agreement.

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- 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
 - STATEMENT
- 36 This bill authorizes a board of education to lease land on which 37 there may, or may not be, a school building when the board 38 determines that the land is not necessary for school purposes but the 39 board does not want to dispose of it. The lease may extend beyond 40 the official life of the board but may not exceed any limit 41 established pursuant to law on the maximum term of a lease that 42 may be entered into by public entities. The lease will be binding 43 upon future boards of education provided that the current board of 44 education awards the lease to the highest bidder after advertisement 45 for bids to lease published in a newspaper at least once a week for 46 two weeks prior to the date fixed for the receipt and opening of 47 bids.

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1 The bill also provides that in the event that a board of education 2 leases a tract of land on which a school building is located, the 3 terms of the lease may authorize the lessee to demolish the school 4 building and to compensate the school district for the value of the 5 school building in accordance with any terms that may be included 6 in the lease agreement.

7 The purpose of this bill is to provide another avenue for school 8 districts to realize a steady stream of revenue. Under current law, a 9 board of education may sell a tract of land or a school building 10 which it has determined is no longer necessary for school purposes. 11 A board of education may also lease a tract of land or building if it does not wish to dispose of it due to the fact that it may be 12 13 necessary for school purposes at some point in the future. Currently 14 any such lease that will be in excess of five years must be approved 15 by the Commissioner of Education. This bill will allow a board of 16 education to lease rather than sell a tract of land that is no longer 17 needed for school purposes. The ability to lease the land will allow 18 a school district to realize a steady stream of revenue over a period 19 of years, which may be more advantageous to the district than 20 absorbing a lump sum payment during one school budget year.
