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1 AN ACT concerning opioid deaths and supplementing Title 26 of the 2 **Revised Statutes.** 3 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 4 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. a. A coroner, medical examiner, or health care professional 8 who examines an individual whose death was caused by opioid $use^{1}[,]^{1}$ shall report the death and the type of opioid that was the 9 cause of death, if ¹[such] <u>that</u>¹ information is ascertainable, to the 10 Department of Health, ¹[as] <u>in a manner</u>¹ determined by the 11 ¹[Department] <u>Commissioner</u>¹ of Health. 12 As used in this ¹[subsection] section¹: 13 ¹<u>"Department" means the Department of Health.</u>¹ 14 "Health care professional" means an individual licensed by this 15 16 State, pursuant to Title 45 of the Revised Statutes, to administer health care in the ordinary course of business or practice of a 17 18 profession. b. The ¹[Department] <u>Commissioner</u>¹ of Health shall publish 19 on 1 [it's] <u>the department's</u> Internet website the number of deaths 20 21 caused by opioids and the type of opioid that was the cause of death, if ¹[such] <u>that</u>¹ information is ascertainable, according to 22 reports received by the ¹[Department of Health] department¹ 23 24 pursuant to subsection a. of this section. 25 2. The ¹[Department] <u>Commissioner</u>¹ of Health shall, pursuant 26 27 to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), adopt rules or regulations as are necessary to effectuate 28 29 the provisions of this act. 30 3. This act shall take effect 180 days after enactment. 31
