SYNOPSIS

Establishes task force to study presence of mercury in floors of certain facilities.

CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT

1 **AN ACT** establishing a task force to study mercury exposure.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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6 1. a. There is established in the Department of Health the 7 Task Force on Mercury Exposure in Schools and Child Care Centers. The duties of the task force shall include: examining the 8 9 health risks associated with flooring that contains mercury; 10 developing best practices with regard to testing the floors of public 11 and nonpublic schools and licensed child care centers to determine 12 whether mercury is present; establishing standards for the 13 remediation of flooring containing mercury; and developing strategies and protocols to assist schools and child care centers to 14 15 implement the best practices developed by task force.

16 b. The task force shall comprise 15 members, as follows:

(1) the Commissioner of Health, the Commissioner of
Environmental Protection, the Commissioner of Education, the
Commissioner of Community Affairs, and the Commissioner of
Children and Families, or their designees, who shall serve ex
officio; and

(2) ten public members, with two each to be appointed by the 22 23 Governor, the Senate President, the Speaker of the General 24 Assembly, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the Minority 25 Leader of the General Assembly. The public members shall have 26 knowledge and experience with regard to identifying and addressing 27 environmental health risks in schools and child care centers, as well 28 as with regard to the particular risks to the public health associated 29 with building materials containing mercury.

30 c. Appointments to the task force shall be made no later than31 30 days after the effective date of this act.

d. The task force shall organize as soon as practicable, but no
later than 30 days following the appointment of its members. The
task force shall choose a chairperson from among its members and
may appoint a secretary who need not be a member of the task
force.

e. Members of the task force shall serve without compensation,
but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenditures incurred in the
performance of their duties as members of the task force within the
limits of funds appropriated or otherwise made available to the task
force for its purposes.

42 f. The Department of Health shall provide stenographic, 43 clerical, and other administrative assistants, and such professional 44 staff as the task force requires to carry out its work. The task force 45 shall be entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the 46 services of the employees of any State, county, or municipal 47 department, board, bureau, commission, or agency as it may require 48 and as may be available for its purposes.

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1 No later than one year after its organization, the task force g. 2 shall submit to the Governor and, pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, 3 c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), to the Legislature, a report containing the 4 findings and recommendations of the task force, including the 5 standards, best practices, and strategies and protocols developed pursuant to subsection a. of this section, and any recommendations 6 7 for legislative, regulatory, or local government action to address 8 issues related to the presence of mercury in schools and child care 9 centers in New Jersey. The task force shall dissolve upon 10 submission of the report required pursuant to this subsection. 11

12 2. This act shall take effect immediately and shall expire upon13 submission of the task force report.

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STATEMENT

18 This bill establishes the Task Force on Mercury Exposure in 19 Schools and Child Care Centers. The task force will be established 20 in the Department of Health, and its duties will include: examining 21 the health risks associated with flooring that contains mercury; 22 developing best practices with regard to testing the floors of schools 23 and licensed child care centers to determine whether mercury is 24 present; establishing standards for remediation of flooring 25 containing mercury; and developing strategies and protocols to 26 assist schools and child care centers to implement the best practices 27 developed by task force.

28 The task force will comprise 15 members, including the 29 Commissioners of Health, Environmental Protection, Education, 30 Community Affairs, and Children and Families, or their designees, 31 who will serve ex officio; and 10 public members, with two each 32 appointed by the Governor, the Senate President, the Speaker of the General Assembly, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the 33 34 Minority Leader of the General Assembly. The public members are 35 to have knowledge and experience with regard to identifying and 36 addressing environmental health risks in schools and child care 37 centers, as well as with regard to the particular risks to the public 38 health associated with building materials containing mercury.

39 Appointments to the task force are to be made no later than 30 40 days after the effective date of the bill, and the task force is to 41 organize as soon as practicable, but no later than 30 days following 42 the appointment of its members. The task force will choose a chairperson from among its members and may appoint a secretary 43 44 who need not be a member of the task force. Members of the task 45 force will serve without compensation, but will be reimbursed for 46 necessary expenditures incurred in the performance of their duties 47 within the limits of available funding.

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1 The Department of Health will provide stenographic, clerical, 2 and other administrative assistants, and such professional staff as 3 the task force requires to carry out its work. The task force will be 4 entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the services of the 5 employees of any State, county, or municipal department, board, 6 bureau, commission, or agency as it may require and as may be 7 available for its purposes.

8 No later than one year after its organization, the task force will 9 be required to submit a report to the Governor and to the 10 Legislature containing its findings and recommendations, including 11 the standards, best practices, and strategies and protocols developed 12 by the task force, and any recommendations for legislative, regulatory, or local government action to address issues related to 13 14 the presence of mercury in schools and child care centers in New 15 Jersey. The task force will dissolve upon submission of its report.

16 Reports suggest that some types of polyurethane flooring 17 commonly used in school buildings, including in multipurpose rooms, gyms, cafeterias, auditoriums, stages, and indoor and 18 19 outdoor tracks, contains a chemical that releases odorless, colorless 20 mercury vapor, which can damage the nervous system, kidneys, 21 lungs, eyes, and skin, and may be particularly harmful to the 22 development of young children. It is the sponsor's intent that New 23 Jersey develop appropriate strategies to detect and remediate 24 mercury hazards in schools and child care centers.
