SYNOPSIS

Urges New Jersey counties and municipalities to commit to becoming agefriendly communities.

1 AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION urging New Jersey counties and 2 municipalities to commit to becoming age-friendly communities. 3 WHEREAS, The United Nations projects that, by the year 2050, the 4 5 number of people worldwide who are aged 60 years or over will 6 more than double to 2.1 billion individuals; and 7 WHEREAS, Older individuals have an increased likelihood of 8 experiencing social isolation as a result of financial and 9 accessibility issues, and may face discrimination due to their age; 10 and 11 WHEREAS, To address the world's aging population, the World Health Organization (WHO) has launched the Global Network of Age-12 Friendly Cities and Communities to help cities in 39 countries 13 14 assess the needs of their older residents and develop more age-15 friendly policies and programs; and 16 WHEREAS, Age-friendly communities establish public policies, 17 services, public transportation, public spaces, and infrastructure 18 designed to enable older adults to participate fully in society, enjoy 19 good health, and live safely; and 20 WHEREAS, The WHO has identified eight Domains of Livability that affect the quality of life of older individuals, which are: Outdoor 21 22 Spaces and Buildings, Transportation, Housing, Social 23 Participation, Respect and Social Inclusion, Civic Participation and 24 Employment, Communication and Information, and Community 25 and Health Services; and 26 WHEREAS, These features of an age-friendly community can be 27 utilized by residents of all ages; and WHEREAS, Since 2012, AARP (formerly the American Association of 28 29 Retired Persons) has affiliated with the WHO to operate the AARP 30 Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities (AARP 31 Network), which supports states, counties, and municipalities as 32 they prepare for the rapid aging of the United States' population by 33 paying increased attention to the environmental, economic, and 34 social factors that influence the health and well-being of older 35 adults; and WHEREAS, The U.S. Census Bureau projects that, by 2030, one in 36 37 every five U.S. residents will be 65 years or older and that, by 2035, people age 65 and older will outnumber the under-18 population; 38 39 and 40 WHEREAS, Older adults are valuable members of American society, 41 making major contributions to our nation's economy, workforce, 42 culture, and family life; and 43 WHEREAS, Nationwide, over 318 communities and three states have 44 been accepted for membership in the AARP Network, including the 45 New Jersey municipalities of Elizabeth, Englewood, Garfield, 46 Maplewood, Montclair, Princeton, South Orange, and Teaneck; 47 now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the General Assembly of the State of New
 Jersey:
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This House respectfully urges New Jersey counties and
 municipalities to commit to taking the steps necessary for
 acceptance into the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and
 Communities, as defined by the World Health Organization.

2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State,
shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly to the
President of the Senate, the New Jersey Association of Counties,
and the New Jersey League of Municipalities.

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STATEMENT

This resolution urges New Jersey counties and municipalities to 17 18 commit to becoming age-friendly communities, as defined by the 19 World Health Organization and AARP. In the U.S., AARP partners 20 with the WHO to operate the Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities, which consists of municipalities and states that are 21 22 committed to supporting the inclusion of older residents in the 23 social, cultural, economic, and political life of the community. To 24 be accepted into the AARP Network of States and Communities, 25 elected officials are required to submit an application on behalf of 26 the state or municipality, which serves as a commitment to conduct a baseline assessment of the community's age-friendliness, develop 27 28 a community action plan based on the assessment's findings, 29 identify measurable outcomes to gauge the action plan's 30 effectiveness, and involve older residents in all facets of plan 31 development and implementation.
