AN ACT concerning prescription medications and supplementing

2 Title 24 and Title 45 of the Revised Statutes. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. a. A health care professional authorized to issue 8 prescriptions shall, when issuing any prescription for a drug or 9 medication which is a controlled dangerous substance, and when 10 issuing a prescription for any other prescription drug or medication as may be designated by the Commissioner of Health by regulation: 11 (1) provide the patient with ¹[oral instructions and]¹ written 12 informational materials advising that when unused, unwanted, or 13 14 expired drugs and medications are not properly, safely, and 15 promptly disposed of: 16 (a) there is a risk that the drug or medication can be stolen, 17 diverted, abused, misused, or accidentally ingested, which can pose 18 a risk to the health and safety of the patient and other members of 19 the patient's household; 20 (b) children are particularly at risk of accidentally ingesting unused, unwanted, and expired medications that have not been 21 22 properly, safely, and promptly disposed of; (c) when drugs or medications are disposed of in the household

The requirements of this subsection shall apply to each prescription issued by the health care professional, regardless of whether the prescription is being issued to a new or existing patient, regardless of whether the prescription is for a new drug or medication or renews or refills a current prescription, and regardless of the health care setting in which the prescription is issued.

b. At such time as any change is made to a patient's course of
treatment that results in a change in the drugs or medications
prescribed for the patient, or in the patient discontinuing the use of
a prescription drug or medication, the health care professional
providing care or treatment to the patient shall:

(1) provide the patient with ¹[oral instructions and]¹ written
informational materials advising that when unused, unwanted, or

Any time a health care professional authorized to issue prescriptions issues a prescription for a hypodermic syringe or 12 13 needle or for any drug or other medication which is to be 14 administered using a hypodermic syringe or needle, the health care professional shall provide the patient with ¹ [oral instructions and] 15 the¹ written informational materials ¹prepared by the Division of 16 17 Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety pursuant to section 3 of this act¹ concerning the safe disposal of 18 used hypodermic syringes and needles so as to prevent against the 19 20 potential transmission of bloodborne pathogens that can occur when 21 used hypodermic syringes and needles are reused or when they 22 cause accidental injury. ¹<u>The health care professional, or an</u> 23 appropriate designee, shall answer any questions the patient may 24 have upon receiving the written informational materials pursuant to this subsection.¹ 25

A pharmacy practice site or health care professional that 28 dispenses prescription drugs, other than a long-term care pharmacy, 29 shall, when dispensing to an individual located in this State a 30 prescription drug or medication which is a controlled dangerous 31 substance, and when dispensing any other prescription drug or 32 medication as may be designated by the Commissioner of Health by 33 regulation:

The requirements of subsection a. of this section shall apply regardless of whether the prescription is an initial prescription or a renewal or refill of an existing prescription, and regardless of whether the patient is a new or returning customer at the pharmacy practice site or is a new or existing patient of the health care professional.

Any time a pharmacy practice site or health care 31 professional that dispenses prescription drugs, other than a long-32 term care pharmacy, sells or dispenses a hypodermic syringe or 33 needle, regardless of whether the hypodermic syringe or needle is 34 sold or dispensed pursuant to a prescription, the pharmacy practice site or health care professional shall provide the patient with ¹[oral 35 36 instructions and] the¹ written informational materials ¹prepared by 37 the Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety pursuant to section 3 of this act¹ concerning the safe 38 39 disposal of used hypodermic syringes and needles so as to prevent 40 against the potential transmission of bloodborne pathogens that can 41 occur when used hypodermic syringes and needles are reused or 42 when they result in accidental injury. ¹<u>The individual selling or</u> 43 dispensing the hypodermic syringe or needle, or an appropriate 44 designee, shall answer any questions the patient may have upon 45 receiving the written informational materials pursuant to this subsection.¹ 46

¹<u>3. The Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law</u> 1 and Public Safety shall prepare written informational materials for 2 distribution to patients by health care professionals and pharmacy 3 4 practice sites concerning the safe disposal of used hypodermic 5 syringes and needles so as to prevent against the potential 6 transmission of bloodborne pathogens that can occur when used 7 hypodermic syringes and needles are reused or when they result in accidental injury. The written informational materials shall be 8 9 made available through the division's Internet website and shall be distributed to health care professionals and pharmacy practice sites 10 upon request.¹ 11 12
