#### **SYNOPSIS**

Urges Secretary of State to assure Legislature and public that State's electoral system is protected from foreign computer hackers.

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A JOINT RESOLUTION urging the Secretary of State to assure the

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5	WHEREAS, In August 2016, it was revealed that the voter registration
6	databases of two states had been hacked by foreign entities seeking
7	to steal the personal information of registered voters; and
8	WHEREAS, In Arizona, foreign hackers stole the user name and
9	password of an election official in one county, and in Illinois the
10	hackers actually accessed that state's voter registration database and
11	stole the personal information of 200,000 registered voters; and
12	WHEREAS, Following these events, the Federal Bureau of
13	Investigation alerted all election officials to monitor their electoral
14	systems for intrusion, and to take measures to protect these systems
15	by adopting procedures to limit access only to essential personnel
16	and measures to enhance cyber security; and
17	WHEREAS, Election processes and systems are the bedrock of our
18	democracy, and when properly protected, they assure the legitimacy
19	of the outcomes of all local, state, and federal elections; and
20	WHEREAS, Foreign intrusion by hackers into election systems and
21	databases in the United States can cast doubts on the integrity of
22	our elections; and
23	WHEREAS, The Secretary of State is the Chief Election Official, and
24	oversees the systems and procedures in place at the State and local
25	levels to conduct our elections; and
26	WHEREAS, The hacking of election databases that took place in
27	Arizona and Illinois raises questions about whether New Jersey's
28	election procedures and systems are currently and sufficiently
29	protected against foreign hackers and other unauthorized intrusions;

31	WHEREAS, It is therefore fitting and proper for the Secretary of State
32	to communicate with the Legislature and the public about the
33	measures currently in place to protect our electoral system, and to
34	reassure the citizens of this State that our procedures and systems
35	are safe and protected from foreign hackers and other intrusions;
36	now, therefore,
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38	BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and General Assembly of the
39	State of New Jersey:
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41	1. The Legislature hereby urges the Secretary of State, as the
42	Chief Election Official, to communicate with the Legislature and
43	the public about the measures currently in place to protect our
44	electoral system, and to reassure the citizens of this State that our
45	procedures and systems are safe and protected from foreign hackers

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and other intrusions.

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2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State,
shall be transmitted by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of
the General Assembly to each county board of elections and
superintendent of elections in this State.

3. This joint resolution shall take effect immediately.

#### **STATEMENT**
