1 A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the Attorney General to study best 2 practices for law enforcement regarding emergency vehicle 3 warning lights and sirens and when to exceed the speed limit. 4 5 WHEREAS, By safely and efficiently responding to service calls, law enforcement officers help to ensure the safety of the citizens and 6 7 residents of this State; and 8 WHEREAS, On any given day, a law enforcement officer may respond 9 to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service; and 10 WHEREAS, A law enforcement officer must quickly calculate how best 11 to respond by considering the nature of the call, the community the 12 officer is travelling through, and the road conditions; and 13 WHEREAS, Depending on the urgency of the call, it may be necessary 14 for a law enforcement officer to exceed the posted speed limit; and 15 WHEREAS, The decision concerning when to exceed the speed limit 16 and utilize the vehicle's emergency light and siren system is often 17 left to the discretion of the individual officer; and WHEREAS, The safety of citizens, residents, and law enforcement 18 officers alike is compromised when an officer fails to appropriately 19 20 utilize a vehicle's emergency light and siren system when 21 exceeding the speed limit; and 22 WHEREAS, A number of tragic accidents have highlighted the need to 23 determine when it is appropriate for an officer to exceed the speed 24 limit and use emergency lights and sirens when responding to a 25 service call: and 26 WHEREAS, The Attorney General guidelines regarding police 27 vehicular pursuit, last updated on September 17, 2009, outline the proper procedures to be followed when police officers are 28 29 confronted with the possibility of pursuing a fleeing vehicle; and 30 WHEREAS, Accordingly, it is in the public interest for the Attorney 31 General to study the implementation of best practices for law 32 enforcement regarding the proper use of a vehicle's emergency 33 light and siren system and when to exceed the speed limit; now, 34 therefore, 35 36 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the Senate of the State of New Jersey: 37 38 1. The Attorney General of New Jersey is urged to conduct a 39 study of best practices for law enforcement regarding the proper use 40 of a vehicle's emergency light and siren system, when to exceed the 41 speed limit, and whether the Attorney General guidelines regarding police vehicular pursuit should be updated and to report the results 42 43 of this study to the Governor, and to Legislature pursuant to section 44 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1) at the earliest possible date. 45 46 2. Duly authenticated copies of this resolution, signed by the President of the Senate and attested by the Secretary thereof, shall 47 be transmitted to the Attorney General. 48

This Senate resolution urges the Attorney General of New Jersey to undertake a study of best practices for law enforcement regarding the proper use of emergency vehicle warning lights and sirens and speeding.

7 By safely and efficiently responding to service calls, law 8 enforcement officers help to ensure the safety of the citizens and 9 residents of this State. On any given day, a law enforcement officer 10 may respond to both emergency and non-emergency calls for 11 service. A law enforcement officer must quickly calculate how best 12 to respond by considering the nature of the call, the community the officer is travelling through, and the road conditions. Depending on 13 14 the urgency of the call, it may be necessary for a law enforcement 15 officer to exceed the posted speed limit. The decision concerning 16 when to exceed the speed limit and utilize the vehicle's emergency 17 light and siren system is often left to the discretion of the individual 18 officer. The safety of citizens, residents, and law enforcement 19 officers alike is compromised when an officer fails to appropriately 20 utilize a vehicle's emergency light and siren system when exceeding the road's speed limit. A number of tragic accidents 21 22 have highlighted the need to determine when it is appropriate for an 23 officer to exceed the speed limit and use emergency lights and 24 sirens when responding to a service call. The Attorney General 25 guidelines regarding police vehicular pursuit outline the proper 26 procedures to be followed when police officers are confronted with 27 the possibility of pursuing a fleeing vehicle; however, these 28 guidelines were last updated on September 17, 2009.

Accordingly, it is in the public interest for the Attorney General to study the implementation of best practices for the use of a vehicle's emergency light and siren system, when to exceed the speed limit, and whether the Attorney General guidelines regarding police vehicular pursuit should be updated.
