- WHEREAS, Melting glaciers, early snowmelt, and severe droughts will cause more dramatic water shortages and increase the risk of wildfires; and
- WHEREAS, Discussion regarding the impacts of global warming and climate change is imperative in order to avoid its worst effects; and
- WHEREAS, Atlantic City has the infrastructure to become an international hub for discussions on global warming and climate change; and
- WHEREAS, In particular, Atlantic City has ample conference facilities, several world class hotels, a conveniently located international airport, and easily accessible transportation by way of trains, buses, and roadways; and
  - WHEREAS, These outstanding facilities allow Atlantic City to welcome scientists, academics, climate experts, government officials, representatives from international organizations, and concerned citizens across the nation and around the world to discuss issues relating to global warming and climate change; and
