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AN ACT concerning behavioral health services and supplementing
 Title 30 of the Revised Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 6 7 As used in this section, "Early Intervention Support 1. a. 8 Services Program" means a program that provides rapid access to 9 short term, recovery-oriented crisis intervention and crisis stabilization services for up to 30 days to an individual 18 years of 10 age or older with a serious mental illness and includes, but is not 11 limited to, medication, therapy, and case management services, 12 which are offered at an on-site location, other than a hospital, or 13 14 through outreach in the community.
 - b. The Department of Health shall expand the Early
 Intervention Support Services Programs currently available in 11
 counties in the State to provide for one such program in each county
 in the State.
 - c. An Early Intervention Support Services Program shall beavailable to provide services 14 hours per day, seven days a week.

d. The department shall coordinate with each county Early
Intervention Support Services Program in the State to provide for
education about the program, and accessibility to the program, to
members of the public served by a county program and to those
organizations or persons who may be the source of referrals to the
county program.

e. The department shall utilize the moneys available to it forthe program to ensure that funding is available for:

(1) expanding the program to each county in the State; and

30 (2) the expansion of a program in existence on the effective date31 of this act, based on the needs of the program to provide services.

32 f. The department shall:

(1) collect, at a minimum, information from each Early
Intervention Support Services Program in the State about the
services provided by the program, the utilization of these services,
and the number of individuals who have been stabilized and
referred to treatment in the community; and

(2) issue, within 18 months of the effective date of this act and
annually thereafter, a report to the Governor and pursuant to section
2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1) to the Legislature, based on the
information collected pursuant to paragraph (1) of this section. The
report shall include a review and analysis of each Early Intervention
Support Services Program in the State and any recommendations for
improvement to the programs.

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2. The Commissioner of Health shall, in accordance with the
"Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et
seq.), adopt any rules and regulations as the commissioner deems
necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.

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This act shall take effect on the first day of the 13th month next
 following the date of enactment, except the Commissioner of Health
 may take any anticipatory administrative action in advance as shall be
 necessary for the implementation of this act.

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STATEMENT

9 This bill expands the Early Intervention Support Services (EISS) 10 Programs, currently available in 11 counties (Atlantic, Bergen, Cumberland, Essex, Hudson, Middlesex, Mercer, 11 Camden, 12 Monmouth, Morris, and Ocean), to provide for one program in each 13 county in the State. An EISS program is defined in the bill as a 14 program that provides rapid access to short term, recovery-oriented 15 crisis intervention and crisis stabilization services for up to 30 days 16 to an individual 18 years of age or older with a serious mental 17 illness and includes, but is not limited to, medication, therapy, and 18 case management services, which are offered at an on-site location, 19 other than a hospital, or through outreach in the community. The 20 bill requires that an EISS program be available to provide services 21 14 hours per day, seven days a week.

22 EISS Programs are designed to provide the crisis intervention 23 and stabilization services needed to help prevent the recurrence of a 24 crisis and to reduce overutilization of hospital emergency 25 departments for a behavioral health crisis. Additionally, the bill 26 requires that the DOH coordinate with each county EISS program in 27 the State to provide for education about the program, and 28 accessibility to the program, to members of the public served by 29 that county program and to those organizations or persons who may 30 be the source of referrals to that program.

31 The bill also provides that DOH is to utilize the moneys 32 available to it for the program to ensure that funding is available 33 for: expanding the program to each county in the State; and the 34 expansion of a program in existence on the effective date of this 35 bill, based on the needs of the program to provide services. The bill 36 requires DOH to collect information from each EISS Program in the 37 State, including information about the services provided, their 38 utilization, and the number of individuals who have been stabilized 39 and referred to treatment. Based on the information collected, the 40 DOH is to issue annual reports to the Governor and to the 41 Legislature, which reports shall include a review and analysis of 42 each program and any recommendations for improvement.
