SYNOPSIS

Establishes pilot program in DOE to support establishment of criminal justice career academies in public high schools.

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AN ACT establishing a criminal justice career academy pilot
 program in the Department of Education.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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7 1. The Commissioner of Education shall establish a five-year 8 pilot program to provide support to school districts in developing 9 and establishing criminal justice career academy programs in high 10 schools within the districts that have partnered with a county 11 college to participate in an early college program. The purpose of 12 the pilot program shall be to afford high school students the 13 opportunity to earn college credit and access hands-on learning 14 experiences in the fields of criminal justice and law enforcement. 15 The purpose of the pilot program shall also be to ensure that 16 participating students are able to cultivate a deeper understanding of 17 career pathways in criminal justice and law enforcement and to 18 attract a more diverse group of applicants who are representative of 19 their community to local law enforcement agencies.

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21 2. A school district seeking to participate in the pilot program 22 shall submit an application to the commissioner. The application 23 shall demonstrate that high schools within the districts have 24 partnered with a county college to participate in an early college 25 program and that students participating in the pilot program will be 26 able to earn college credits as a result of the coursework completed 27 through the criminal justice career academy. The application shall 28 also identify the high school or high schools within the district in 29 which the criminal justice career academy will be established. As 30 appropriate, the application shall demonstrate that the criminal 31 justice career academy program meets all applicable State Board of 32 Education regulations and standards and other Department of 33 Education requirements for career and technical education programs 34 or programs of study and the New Jersey Student Learning 35 Standards. The application shall include:

a. a detailed plan outlining the coursework that will be
completed by a student participating in the criminal justice career
academy;

b. details on the existing partnerships with county colleges to
provide college-level courses in criminal justice to academy
students or any agreements with appropriate county colleges to
accept a certain number of college credits for coursework
completed in the career academy;

44 c. details on any partnerships formed with local law45 enforcement agencies or community organizations;

d. the student application process and any student eligibilitycriteria required for participation in the career academy;

1 a description of the hands-on student learning experiences e. 2 that will be incorporated into the career academy coursework; 3 a plan for the continuation of the career academy upon the f. 4 expiration of the pilot program established pursuant to this act; 5 information on the amount of State grant funds needed to g. support the establishment of the criminal justice career academy 6 7 and the intended uses of those funds; and 8 h. any other information deemed necessary by the 9 commissioner. 10 11 3. a. Upon review of the applications submitted pursuant to 12 section 2 of this act, the commissioner shall select at least one 13 school district in each county which has at least one municipality 14 with a resident population of over 75,000 individuals according to 15 the most recent federal decennial census. In making the selections, the commissioner shall consult with the Attorney General and the 16 17 Superintendent of State Police to prioritize school districts that 18 demonstrate a need to diversify the law enforcement agencies of the county or municipality in which the school district is situate. 19 20 b. The commissioner shall provide such guidance, support, and 21 training to selected school districts as may be necessary to establish 22 the criminal justice career academies. 23 The commissioner shall award grants, within the limit of c. 24 available State appropriations, to selected school districts to be used 25 to support the development and implementation of the criminal 26 justice career academies. The commissioner shall determine the 27 amount of each grant awarded under the pilot program and may 28 award multi-year grants. 29 30 4. a. A school district selected to participate in the pilot 31 program shall, at intervals to be determined by the commissioner, prepare and submit to the commissioner reports on the district's 32 33 experience with and the effects of the pilot program. The reports 34 shall include, but need not be limited to: 35 (1) the high schools in the district that established criminal 36 justice career academies under the pilot program; 37 (2) the number of students enrolled in the district's criminal 38 justice career academies; 39 (3) a description of the academy coursework requirements; 40 (4) the number of college credits, certifications, and credentials 41 earned by students through academy coursework; 42 (5) the use of State grant funds provided to the school district 43 under the pilot program; and 44 (6) information on student outcomes including, but not limited 45 to, academic performance indicators and postsecondary and 46 employment opportunities sought by graduates of the career 47 academy.

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1 b. At the conclusion of the pilot program, the commissioner 2 shall submit a report to the Governor, and to the Legislature 3 pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), on the implementation and effectiveness of the pilot program. The report 4 5 shall include, but need not be limited to, a summary of the 6 information submitted by school districts pursuant to subsection a. 7 of this section and the commissioner's recommendation on the 8 feasibility of continuing and expanding the pilot program.

5. This act shall take effect immediately and shall first apply tothe first full school year following the date of enactment.

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STATEMENT

16 This bill requires the Commissioner of Education to establish a 17 five-year pilot program to provide support to school districts in 18 developing and establishing criminal justice career academy 19 programs in high schools within the districts. Generally speaking, 20 career academies are small learning communities comprised of 21 groups of students within a larger high school community who take 22 classes together for at least two years and are taught by a team of 23 teachers from different disciplines. The academies provide students 24 a college preparatory curriculum with a particular career theme and 25 offer other opportunities through partnerships with employers, the 26 community, and local institutions of higher education.

27 To participate in the pilot program, a school district is required 28 to submit an application to the commissioner. In its application, a 29 school district is required to demonstrate that high schools within 30 the district have partnered with a county college to participate in an 31 early college program and that students will be able to earn college 32 credits as a result of coursework completed through the criminal 33 justice career academy. The application will identify the high 34 school or high schools within the district in which a career academy 35 will be established. As appropriate, applicant school districts are 36 required to ensure that the criminal justice career academy 37 programs meet all applicable State Board of Education regulations 38 and standards and other Department of Education requirements for 39 career and technical education programs or programs of study and 40 the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. Under the bill, 41 applicant school districts are required to include in the application 42 several pieces of information related to the proposed career 43 academy.

The commissioner will select at least one school district in each county which has at least one municipality with a resident population of over 75,000 individuals according to the most recent federal decennial census. In making the selections, the commissioner will consult with the Attorney General and the

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1 Superintendent of State Police to prioritize school districts that demonstrate a need to diversify the law enforcement agencies of the 2 3 county or municipality in which the school district is situate. The 4 commissioner will provide guidance, support, and training to 5 participating school districts to establish the criminal justice career 6 academies. The commissioner will also award grants to 7 participating school districts to be used to support the development 8 and implementation of the career academies.

9 A school district selected to participate in the pilot program will 10 prepare and submit to the commissioner periodic reports on the 11 district's experience with and the effects of the pilot program. At 12 the conclusion of the pilot program, the commissioner will submit a 13 report to the Governor, and to the Legislature, on the 14 implementation and effectiveness of the pilot program.
