SYNOPSIS

Petitions federal government for emergency response funding to support safe reopening of schools following COVID-19 pandemic.

1 **A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION** respectfully petitioning the federal
2 government for emergency response funding to support the safe
3 reopening of schools following the COVID-19 pandemic.
4

5 **WHEREAS**, The provision of a thorough and efficient education to all
6 children, representing a constitutional obligation of this State as
7 well as a moral responsibility of this nation, depends upon a
8 commitment to invest in safe school environments in which
9 students can learn and grow; and

10 **WHEREAS**, Following the recent outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic,
11 the Governor issued a series of executive orders to declare a public
12 health emergency and order the closure of all public, private, and
13 parochial schools in the State; and

14 **WHEREAS**, While the students and teachers of this State worked
15 tirelessly to complete the 2019-2020 school year through remote
16 instruction, the realities of virtual education have limited the
17 academic and social development of many students, especially
18 those who lack access to online instruction; and

19 **WHEREAS**, During this time, the United States Centers for Disease
20 Control and Prevention (CDC) issued recommendations concerning
21 the reopening of schools in a manner that protects the health and
22 safety of every student and school employee; and

23 **WHEREAS**, A recent cost analysis conducted by ASSA, The School
24 Superintendents Association and the Association of School
25 Business Officials International suggests that compliance with these
26 CDC recommendations could be cost-prohibitive for many school
27 districts, which are expected to incur additional expenses of at least
28 \$490 per student; and

29 **WHEREAS**, According to this analysis, the average school district is
30 expected to incur reopening expenses of nearly \$1.8 million,
31 including costs associated with adhering to health monitoring and
32 cleaning protocols, hiring additional staff to implement health and
33 safety protocols, providing personal protective equipment for staff
34 and students, and providing transportation and before and after
35 school programs in accordance with social distancing guidelines;
36 and

37 **WHEREAS**, In response to the outbreak of COVID-19, the federal
38 government enacted the “Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic
39 Security Act” (CARES Act), which made approximately \$310
40 million available to local education agencies in this State through
41 the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund
42 (ESSERF); and

43 **WHEREAS**, Although the CARES Act permits local education agencies
44 to use these monies to support various pandemic response and
45 reopening efforts, the current level of federal funding has failed to
46 ensure that every school district possesses the financial resources
47 necessary to safely reopen; and

1 **WHEREAS**, Absent an additional round of federal emergency response
2 funding that dedicates monies toward school reopening efforts,
3 many school districts could be forced to continue remote instruction
4 for the indefinite future or reopen without adequate health and
5 safety protections, thereby potentially causing students and staff to
6 suffer irreversible harm; now, therefore,

8 **BE IT RESOLVED** *by the General Assembly of the State of New*
9 *Jersey (the Senate concurring):*

11 1. The Legislature of the State of New Jersey respectfully
12 petitions the Congress and President to enact legislation that
13 provides additional emergency response funding to support the
14 costs of safely reopening schools following the COVID-19
15 pandemic.

17 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of the
18 State, shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly or
19 the Secretary of the Senate to the President and Vice-President of
20 the United States, the Majority and Minority Leaders of the United
21 States Senate, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the United States
22 House of Representatives, and each member of the United States
23 Congress elected from the State of New Jersey.
