

SYNOPSIS

Urges US President and Congress to establish student loan forgiveness program for certain doctors, nurses, and emergency medical services employees.

1 AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION urging the United States President and 2 Congress to establish a student loan forgiveness program for 3 certain doctors, nurses, and emergency medical services 4 employees. 5 6 WHEREAS, Doctors, nurses, and emergency medical services (EMS) 7 employees are essential to the effective functioning of the United 8 States healthcare system; and 9 WHEREAS, Doctors, nurses, and EMS employees exemplify 10 selflessness and bravery while responding to, caring for, and 11 protecting American citizens who are struggling with illnesses and 12 injuries; and 13 WHEREAS, The day-to-day jobs of doctors, nurses, and EMS 14 employees are stressful, and in many cases, these employees may 15 risk their lives to care for the patients around them; and 16 WHEREAS, The already stressful job of doctors, nurses, and EMS 17 employees is exacerbated during crises, such as the current global 18 coronavirus pandemic; and 19 WHEREAS, Coronavirus, also known as COVID-19, is a respiratory 20 illness that was first identified during an outbreak in Wuhan, China 21 and has since expanded across various continents including Asia, 22 Europe, North America, South America, Africa, and Australia; and 23 WHEREAS, There have been millions of cases of COVID-19 24 confirmed worldwide with cases in the United States and New 25 Jersey, and the number of confirmed cases of COVID-19 is 26 expected to rise into the future; and WHEREAS, The global COVID-19 pandemic has placed additional 27 pressures on doctors, nurses, and EMS employees as these 28 29 individuals are the nation's frontline defense against the disease; 30 31 WHEREAS, Doctors, nurses, and EMS employees, during the COVID-19 pandemic, continue to provide professional care services with 32 33 limited resources and shortages of protective equipment, such as 34 N95 face masks, and they continue to remain emotionally tough as 35 many of their patients become ill or pass away around them; and WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a highly contagious disease and, in many 36 37 cases, can be dangerous and fatal; doctors, nurses, and EMS 38 employees continue to risk their lives daily working amongst this 39 life-threatening disease; and 40 WHEREAS, A growing number of healthcare professionals have 41 contracted COVID-19 while performing their jobs; some of these 42 infected healthcare professionals have been placed in critical 43 condition or have even died due to COVID-19-related 44 complications; and 45 WHEREAS, Doctors, nurses, and EMS employees will continue to risk 46 their lives throughout the remainder of the global COVID-19

pandemic, but their contribution to society will not end; these

AR155 DEPHILLIPS, DIMASO 1 healthcare professionals will continue to protect American citizens 2 from injuries and illnesses into the future; and 3 WHEREAS, Healthcare professionals, such as doctors, nurses, and 4 EMS employees, undertake many years of additional schooling in 5 order to serve in their professional roles; this lengthy education 6 results in large student loan debts; and 7 WHEREAS, The Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program (PSLF) 8 may apply to doctors, nurses, and EMS employees who work full-9 time for federal, state, tribal, or local government agencies and to 10 those who work for non-profit organizations; however, it does not 11 apply to doctors, nurses, and EMS employees who cannot meet this 12 criteria, such as those who work for private organizations; and WHEREAS, The bravery, selflessness, and ceaseless work ethic of the 13 14 nation's healthcare professionals, during the COVID-19 pandemic, 15 should be rewarded by ensuring that all doctors, nurses, and EMS 16 employees involved in the provision of services during the 17 pandemic are eligible to receive federal student loan forgiveness; 18 now, therefore, 19 20 BE IT RESOLVED by the General Assembly of the State of New 21 Jersey: 22 23 1. This House urges the United States President and Congress 24 to establish a student loan forgiveness program for doctors, nurses, 25 and emergency medical services employees who provide services 26 during the COVID-19 pandemic. 27 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of the 28 29 State, shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly to 30 the President of the United States, the Majority and Minority Leaders 31 of the United States Senate, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the 32

United States House of Representatives, and the members of the New Jersey congressional delegation.

This resolution urges Congress to establish a student loan forgiveness program for doctors, nurses, and emergency medical services employees that provide services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Doctors, nurses, and EMS employees respond to, care for, and protect American citizens from illness and injury every day. However, the already stressful job of doctors, nurses, and EMS employees is exacerbated during crises, such as the COVID-19 pandemic. COVID-19 has increased the workloads of healthcare professionals and has forced doctors, nurses, and EMS employees to risk their lives while providing professional care services for

others amidst this dangerous disease. Healthcare professionals continue to protect and care for their patients, during the COVID-19 pandemic, amongst limited resources and shortages of protective equipment.

5 The bravery, courageousness, selflessness, and ceaseless work ethic of the nation's healthcare professionals, during the COVID-19 6 7 pandemic, should be rewarded. Although there is no reward that 8 equates to the risks these healthcare professionals have taken, 9 during the COVID-19 pandemic, the United States can provide 10 monetary aid to these healthcare professionals, which will help minimize the massive student loan debts these healthcare 11 professionals have accumulated over the years as a result of lengthy 12 education. Establishing a student loan forgiveness program for 13 14 doctors, nurses, and EMS employees who provided services during 15 the COVID-19 pandemic will reduce financial stressors among 16 these hardworking healthcare professionals and show them that the 17 United States acknowledges and appreciates their hard work during 18 this challenging time.
