

Respectfully urges National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum induct Joan Whitney Payson into Hall of Fame.

1 AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION respectfully urging the National 2 Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum to induct Joan Whitney 3 Payson into the Hall of Fame. 4 5 WHEREAS, Joan Whitney Payson was born on February 5, 1903, in New York City, was a member of the prominent Whitney family, 6 7 and the granddaughter of former Secretary to President Abraham Lincoln and United States Secretary of State John Hay; and 8 9 WHEREAS, An avid sports enthusiast, Mrs. Payson operated the highly 10 successful Greentree Stable, winning numerous notable graded 11 stakes races, including the Kentucky Derby twice, the Preakness 12 Stakes once, and the Belmont Stakes four times; and 13 WHEREAS, Mrs. Payson purchased a minority stake in the New York Giants, which she sold when the team moved to San Francisco in 14 15 1957; and 16 WHEREAS, After the Giants' departure, Mrs. Payson spearheaded the 17 effort to return National League baseball to New York, and in 1962, 18 she became the majority owner of the New York Metropolitan Baseball Club, the "Mets"; and 19 20 WHEREAS, Mrs. Payson was the first woman to buy majority control 21 of a team in a major North American sports league; and 22 WHEREAS, Mrs. Payson served as the team's first president from 1962 to 1975, overseeing the Mets' first of two World Series 23 24 Championships in 1969, a team often known as the "Miracle Mets" 25 because of its perceived underdog status; and 26 WHEREAS, Active in the affairs of her "Amazin' Mets," Mrs. Payson 27 was much admired by the team's personnel and players and was inducted posthumously into the New York Mets Hall of Fame in 28 29 1981; and 30 WHEREAS, The Mets are about to begin their 60th season, having 31 brought joy, exhilaration, heartbreak, and entertainment to millions of New Jerseyans; and 32 33 WHEREAS, In addition to her work in baseball, Mrs. Payson was a 34 prominent philanthropist, including establishing the "Helen Hay Whitney Foundation" for medical research and, together with her 35 husband, providing funds to build Pepperdine University's library; 36 37 and WHEREAS, Mrs. Payson passed away on October 4, 1975, in New 38 39 York City, just following the conclusion of the Mets' 1975 season; 40 and WHEREAS, Despite the numerous contributions by women to the 41 42 game of baseball, only one woman, out of 333 total inductees, 43 has been inducted into the Hall of Fame; and 44 WHEREAS, The Golden Days Era Committee was established by the 45 National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum Board of Directors 46 in 2016 to consider Hall of Fame candidates whose primary contributions to the game came from 1950 to 1969; and 47

1 WHEREAS, Mrs. Payson's contributions to Major League Baseball 2 during that period, including owning a minority stake in the New 3 York Giants, co-founding the New York Mets, and winning the 4 1969 World Series Championship, make her more than qualified for 5 induction into the Hall of Fame through the Golden Days Era Committee, which next meets to consider candidates in the fall of 6 7 2021; and 8 WHEREAS, In light of Mrs. Payson's extraordinary achievements and 9 contributions to baseball, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and 10 Museum and the Golden Days Era Committee should strongly 11 consider and ultimately induct Joan Whitney Payson as part of the 12 Hall of Fame's Class of 2022; now, therefore, 13 14 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the General Assembly of the State of New 15 Jersey: 16 17 1. This House respectfully urges the Golden Days Era Committee of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum to 18 induct Joan Whitney Payson into the Hall of Fame as part of the 19 20 Class of 2022 for her extraordinary achievements and contributions 21 to Major League Baseball. 22 23 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State, 24 shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly to the 25 Commissioner of Major League Baseball, the President of the 26 National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum, the Chairperson of 27 the Board of Directors of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum, and to the family of Joan Whitney Payson. 28 29 30 31 **STATEMENT** 32 33 This resolution respectfully urges the National Baseball Hall of 34 Fame and Museum to induct Joan Whitney Payson into the Hall of 35 Fame. 36 Mrs. Payson was instrumental in the history of Major League 37 Baseball (MLB) from the 1950s to the 1970s. Following the New York Giants' decision to move the franchise to San Francisco in 38 39 1957, Mrs. Payson, who was a minority stakeholder at the time, 40 sold her stake in the team and spearheaded an effort to create a new 41 franchise for New York City. In 1962, Mrs. Payson co-founded the 42 New York Mets to compete in the National League of MLB. Mrs. Payson would serve as the team's president from 1962 to 1975. She 43 44 was the first woman to buy majority control of a team in a major 45 North American sports league. 46 Mrs. Payson was deeply involved in all aspects of the franchise 47 and much admired by the team's personnel and players. In 1969, in 48 just their 8th season in existence, the Mets would win their first of

two World Series Championships. The 1969 team became known
as the "Miracle Mets" because of their perceived underdog status
against the heavily favored Baltimore Orioles. Mrs. Payson
continued to serve as president of the Mets until her death in 1975.

5 Despite the numerous contributions by women to the game of baseball, only one woman, out of 333 total inductees, has been 6 7 inducted into the Hall of Fame. The Golden Days Era Committee 8 of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was established 9 in 2016 to consider Hall of Fame candidates whose primary 10 contributions to the game came from 1950 to 1969. Mrs. Payson's 11 contributions to Major League Baseball during that period make her more than qualified for induction through the Golden Days Era 12 Committee, which next meets to consider candidates in the fall of 13 14 2021. Based off of these qualifications, the National Baseball Hall 15 of Fame and Museum and the Golden Days Era Committee should 16 strongly consider and ultimately induct Joan Whitney Payson as 17 part of the Hall of Fame's Class of 2022.
