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4	WHEREAS, The coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic has caused
5	millions of Americans to lose their jobs through no fault of their
6	own, and many of the job losses are permanent; and
7	WHEREAS, In 2020, the unemployment rate among veterans rose to
8	6.5 percent, after having been just 3.1 percent in 2019; and
9	WHEREAS, Of the 462,000 veterans unemployed at the beginning of
10	2021, more than 81 percent are of prime working age, between 22
11	and 66 years old; and
12	WHEREAS, The "Veterans Economic Recovery Act of 2021" (H.R.
13 14	637) would create a program to retrain unemployed veterans and members of the National Guard or Reserve with up to 12 months of
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16	education benefits to pursue training in high-demand occupations; and
17	WHEREAS, These benefits would be equivalent to the benefits
18	provided under the post-9/11 GI Bill, focusing on veterans who are
19	not currently eligible for those GI Bill benefits; and
20	WHEREAS, Members of the National Guard or Reserve who were
21	mobilized on federal orders to assist with State responses to the
22	coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic would also be eligible for the
23	training program; and
24	WHEREAS, According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the
25	unemployment rate for veterans in New Jersey in 2020 was 8.1
26	percent, higher than the national average; and
27	WHEREAS, This legislation would therefore be of particular benefit
28	to the population of unemployed veterans who call New Jersey
29	home; and
30	WHEREAS, It is fitting and proper for the United States to provide
31	these benefits to veterans who have lost their jobs as a result of the
32	coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic, and to National Guard or
33	Reserve members who have given up their t

#### **STATEMENT**

This Assembly resolution urges the United States Congress to pass the "Veterans Economic Recovery Act of 2021," to provide unemployed veterans and members of the National Guard and Reserves with education benefits to pursue training in high-demand occupations.

As of December 2020, the unemployment rate among veterans rose to 6.5 percent, after having been just 3.1 percent in 2019, and of the 462,000 veterans unemployed at the beginning of 2021, more than 81 percent are of prime working age, between 22 and 66 years old. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the unemployment rate for veterans in New Jersey in 2020 was 8.1 percent, higher than the national average.

The "Veterans Economic Recovery Act of 2021" would create a program to retrain unemployed veterans and members of the National Guard or Reserve with 12 months of education benefits to pursue training in high-demand occupations. These benefits would be equivalent to the benefits provided under the post-9/11 GI Bill, focusing on veterans who are not currently eligible for those GI Bill benefits. Members of the National Guard or Reserve who were mobilized on federal orders to assist with state responses to the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic would also be eligible for the training program.
