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AN ACT concerning resident tuition rates for dependent children of 1 2 United States military personnel and amending P.L.1985, c.231. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. Section 1 of P.L.1985, c.231 (C.18A:62-4.1) is amended to 8 read as follows: 9 1. a. United States military personnel and their dependents who are living in New Jersey and are attending public institutions 10 of higher education in New Jersey shall be regarded as residents of 11 12 the State for the purpose of determining tuition. b. A dependent child of United States military personnel who 13 14 attended high school in New Jersey for a minimum of three years 15 shall be regarded by a public institution of higher education in New Jersey as a resident of the State for the purpose of determining 16 17 tuition, regardless of where the dependent child resides upon 18 enrollment in the institution. 19 (cf: P.L.1985, c.231, s.1) 20 21 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
