## **SYNOPSIS**

Requires health care facilities to screen health care workers, first responders, and other frontline workers for symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder related to COVID-19 pandemic.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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7 1. a. Health care facilities licensed pursuant to P.L.1971, c.136 8 (C.26:2H-1 et seq.) shall establish procedures to screen health care 9 workers, first responders, and other frontline workers, upon intake 10 for inpatient or outpatient services, for the symptoms of post-11 traumatic stress disorder related to the coronavirus disease 2019 12 (COVID-19) pandemic. Each facility shall implement measures to 13 avoid performing redundant screenings on a given health care 14 worker, first responder, or other frontline worker, both at the same 15 facility and at other facilities in the State, unless the individual 16 requests a subsequent screening or a subsequent screening appears 17 to be clinically appropriate. Health care workers, first responders, 18 and other frontline workers presenting at a facility for health care 19 services shall have the right to refuse to be screened for the 20 symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder related to the COVID-21 19 pandemic. In the event a health care worker, first responder, or 22 other frontline worker screens positive for the symptoms of post-23 traumatic stress disorder related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 24 facility shall offer to assist the individual with referrals to 25 appropriate treatment resources and shall provide the individual 26 with a link to the informational resources published on the Internet 27 websites of the Department of Health and the Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services in the Department of Human 28 29 Services pursuant to subsection c. of this section.

30 b. Health care facilities employing health care workers, first 31 responders, or other frontline workers who provided services in response to the COVID-19 pandemic or who provided essential 32 33 services during the COVID-19 pandemic shall ensure that those 34 health care workers, first responders, and other frontline workers 35 are provided with information about the resources that are available 36 concerning to post-traumatic stress disorder related to the COVID-37 19 pandemic, including, but not limited to, employee assistance 38 programs and a link to the informational resources published on the 39 Internet websites of the Department of Health and the Division of 40 Mental Health and Addiction Services in the Department of Human 41 Services pursuant to subsection c. of this section.

c. The Department of Health and the Division of Mental Health
and Addiction Services in the Department of Human Services shall:
(1) jointly develop a screening tool for post-traumatic stress
disorder related to the COVID-19 pandemic, along with guidance
concerning the use of the screening tool, for use by health care
facilities for the purposes of conducting screenings pursuant to
subsection a. of this section;

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(2) publish on their respective Internet websites information and
a list of available resources related to treatment for post-traumatic
stress disorder, including links to appropriate third-party resource
providers, for use by health care facilities in connection with
subsections a. and b. of this section; and

6 (3) provide such other resources and implement such other 7 programs and initiatives as each shall determine to be appropriate to 8 meet the clinical needs of health care workers, first responders, and 9 other frontline workers experiencing post-traumatic stress disorder 10 related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

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2. This act shall take effect 60 days after the date of enactment.

#### STATEMENT

17 This bill requires health care facilities to establish procedures to 18 screen health care workers, first responders, and other frontline 19 workers, upon intake for inpatient or outpatient services, for the 20 symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) related to the 21 coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic. Each facility is 22 to implement measures to avoid performing redundant screenings 23 on a given health care worker, first responder, or other frontline 24 worker, both at that facility and at other facilities throughout the 25 State, unless the individual requests a subsequent screening or a 26 subsequent screening appears to be clinically appropriate. Health 27 care workers, first responders, and other frontline workers will have 28 the right to refuse to be screened for the symptoms of PTSD related 29 to the COVID-19 pandemic.

30 In the event a health care worker, first responder, or other 31 frontline worker screens positive for the symptoms of PTSD related 32 to the COVID-19 pandemic, the facility will be required to offer to 33 assist the individual with referrals to appropriate treatment 34 resources and a link to informational resources that are required to 35 published on the Internet websites of the Department of Health (DOH) and the Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services 36 37 (DMHAS) in the Department of Human Services under the bill.

The DOH and DMHAS will be required to develop a PTSD 38 39 screening tool, and guidance concerning the use of the screening 40 tool, for use by health care facilities in complying with the 41 requirements of the bill. In addition, the DOH and DMHAS are to 42 provide other resources and implement other programs and 43 initiatives as they deem appropriate to meet the clinical needs of 44 health care workers, first responders, and other frontline workers 45 experiencing PTSD related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The bill additionally requires health care facilities employing
health care workers, first responders, or other frontline workers who
provided services in response to the COVID-19 pandemic or who

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provided essential services during the COVID-19 pandemic to 1 ensure that those health care workers and first responders are 2 provided with information concerning available resources and 3 services for PTSD related to the COVID-19 pandemic, including, 4 5 but not limited to, employee assistance programs and a link to the 6 informational resources the bill requires to be published on the Internet websites of the DOH and the DMHAS. 7
