Condemns Trump Administration's proposed rule limiting categorical eligibility for SNAP.

1 Α CONCURRENT RESOLUTION condemning the Trump 2 Administration's proposed rule limiting categorical eligibility for 3 the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). 4 5 WHEREAS, The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or 6 SNAP, provides nutrition benefits to supplement the food budget of 7 low-income families in order to purchase healthy food and move 8 towards self-sufficiency; and 9 WHEREAS, This nationwide program is federally regulated by the 10 United States Department of Agriculture pursuant to the "Food and 11 Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.110-246 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.); 12 and 13 WHEREAS, The federal law authorizing SNAP establishes specific income and asset tests for determining benefit eligibility, and 14 15 permits states to grant "categorical eligibility" for SNAP benefits to 16 individuals who have already been certified for similar means-17 tested programs, such as the Temporary Assistance for Needy 18 Families (TANF) program; and WHEREAS, The Trump Administration has proposed limiting 19 20 categorical eligibility for SNAP to individuals who qualify for TANF-funded cash benefits of at least \$50 per month for a 21 minimum of six months, and "substantial" non-cash TANF 22 23 benefits, such as subsidized employment, work supports, or 24 childcare; and 25 WHEREAS, The New Jersey Department of Human Services estimates 26 that as many as 68,000 New Jersey residents, or nine percent of 27 SNAP recipients, would lose SNAP benefits under the Trump Administration's proposal; and 28 29 WHEREAS, Of the 68,000 SNAP recipients who would likely lose their 30 benefits under the Administration's proposal, 26,000 are children 31 under the age of 18 and 15,000 are senior citizens; and 32 WHEREAS, The loss of SNAP benefits could hold significant 33 consequences for these New Jersey residents, as studies show that 34 SNAP participants have better overall dietary quality and health 35 status, and fewer hospitalizations, compared with low-income individuals who do not participate in SNAP; and 36 37 WHEREAS, The Trump Administration's proposed restrictions on 38 SNAP eligibility translate to an annual benefits loss of \$33 million 39 for New Jersey's most vulnerable citizens; and 40 WHEREAS, The Administration's proposed rule would have a ripple 41 effect throughout the State, potentially impacting other income-42 based programs, such as the School Lunch and School Breakfast 43 Programs, and the Community Eligibility Program, under which 44 certain school districts in impoverished areas can provide free lunch 45 to all enrolled students; and 46 WHEREAS, This proposed rule may potentially reduce the allocation of federal Title I education funding for schools with a high percentage 47 48 of students who qualify for free or reduced price lunch; and

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WHEREAS. It is in the best interest of the citizens of this State.

This Legislature condemns the Trump Administration's 11 proposal to restrict categorical eligibility for the Supplemental 12 Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to households that qualify for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)-funded cash 13 14 benefits of at least \$50 per month for a minimum of six months, and 15 such non-cash TANF benefits as subsidized employment, work 16 supports, or childcare. 17 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State, 18 19 shall be transferred by the Clerk of the General Assembly or the 20 Secretary of the Senate to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture, and to 21 22 every member of New Jersey's Congressional delegation. 23 24 25 **STATEMENT** 26 27 This concurrent resolution condemns the Trump Administration's proposal to limit categorical eligibility for the 28 29 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, to 30 households that qualify for Temporary Assistance for Needy 31 Families (TANF)-funded cash benefits of at least \$50 per month for a minimum of six months. Additionally, the proposal would restrict 32 33 the types of non-cash TANF benefits that confer categorical

34 eligibility to subsidized employment, work supports, or childcare. 35 SNAP provides nutrition benefits to supplement the food budget of low-income families, individuals, senior citizens, and people 36 37 with disabilities in order to purchase healthy food and move While the federal government funds 38 towards self-sufficiency. 39 SNAP benefits, it shares the cost of program administration with the 40 states, which operate the program. The Administration's proposed rule would deny critical food
assistance to the State's most vulnerable residents. The New Jersey
Department of Human Services estimates that 68,000 residents
would lose SNAP benefits under this proposal, including 26,000

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- 1 children aged 18 and under and 15,000 senior citizens. Many of the
- 2 people who would be affected are low-wage workers, such as direct
- 3 care workers, retail cashiers, and teacher assistants.
