1 AN ACT establishing health care claims fraud as a criminal offense and
2 supplementing chapters 21 ¹[and] ¹ 51 ¹ and ¹ 52¹ of Title 2C of the
3 New Jersey Statutes.

4
5 **BE IT ENACTED** *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
6 *of New Jersey:*

7
8 ¹1. The Legislature finds and declares:

9 a. Billions of dollars are spent each year on health care in New
10 Jersey. Approximately ten percent of these costs can be attributed to
11 fraud.

12 b. In order to maintain the financial integrity of the health care
13 system in this State, it is necessary to prosecute and deter the
14 commission of fraud.

15 c. Under the current law, it is difficult to prosecute and deter
16 health care claims fraud because fraudulent claims often involve small
17 amounts that require prosecutors to prove hundreds of relatively small
18 thefts in order to establish a second degree offense.

19 d. It is, therefore, necessary to establish the crime of "health care
20 claims fraud" to enable more efficient prosecution of criminally
21 culpable persons who knowingly, or with criminal recklessness, submit
22 false or fraudulent claims for payment or reimbursement for health
23 care services. It is not the intent of this act to facilitate the
24 prosecution of those persons who may make negligent errors in the
25 preparation of filing of bills or claims.¹

27 ¹[1.] 2.¹ As used in this act:

28 "Health care claims fraud" means making, or causing to be made,
29 a false, fictitious, fraudulent, or misleading statement of material fact
30 in, or omitting a material fact from, or causing a material fact to be

1 omitted from, any record, bill, claim or other document, in writing,
2 electronically or in any other form, that a person attempts to submit,
3 submits, causes to be submitted, or attempts to cause to be submitted
4 for payment or reimbursement for health care services.

5 "Practitioner" means a person licensed in this State to practice
6 medicine and surgery, chiropractic, podiatry, dentistry, optometry,
7 psychology, pharmacy, nursing, physical therapy, or law; any other
8 person licensed, registered or certified by any State agency to practice
9 a profession or occupation in the State of New Jersey or any person
10 similarly licensed, registered, or certified in another jurisdiction.

12 ¹[2] ³1. a. A practitioner is guilty of a crime of the second degree
13 if that person knowingly commits health care claims fraud ¹in the
14 course of providing professional services¹. In addition to all other
15 criminal penalties allowed by law, a person convicted under this
16 subsection may be subject to a fine of up to five times the pecuniary
17 benefit obtained or sought to be obtained.

18 b. A practitioner is guilty of a crime of the third degree if that
19 person recklessly commits health care claims fraud ¹in the course of
20 providing professional services¹. In addition to all other criminal
21 penalties allowed by law, a person convicted under this subsection may
22 be subject to a fine of up to five times the pecuniary benefit obtained
23 or sought to be obtained.

24 c. A person, who is not a practitioner ¹subject to the provisions of
25 subsection a. or b. of this section¹, is guilty of a crime of the third
26 degree if that person knowingly commits health care claims fraud. A
27 person, who is not a practitioner ¹subject to the provisions of
28 subsection a. or b. of this section¹, is guilty of a crime of the second
29 degree if that person knowingly commits five or more acts of health
30 care claims fraud and the aggregate pecuniary benefit obtained or
31 sought to be obtained is at least \$1,000. In addition to all other
32 criminal penalties allowed by law, a person convicted under this
33 subsection ¹[c.]¹ may be subject to a fine of up to five times the
34 pecuniary benefit obtained or sought to be obtained.

35 d. A person, who is not a practitioner ¹subject to the provisions of
36 subsection a. or b. of this section¹, is guilty of a crime of the fourth
37 degree if that person recklessly commits health care claims fraud. In
38 addition to all other criminal penalties allowed by law, a person
39 convicted under this subsection ¹[d.]¹ may be subject to a fine of up to
40 five times the pecuniary benefit obtained or sought to be obtained.

41 e. Each act of health care claims fraud shall constitute an
42 additional, separate and distinct offense, except that five or more
43 separate acts may be aggregated for the purpose of establishing
44 liability pursuant to subsection c. of this section.

45 f. (1) The falsity, fictitiousness, fraudulence or misleading nature
46 of a statement ¹[is presumed] may be inferred by the trier of fact¹ in

1 the case of a practitioner who attempts to submit, submits, causes to
 2 be submitted, or attempts to cause to be submitted, any record, bill,
 3 claim or other document for treatment or procedure without the
 4 practitioner ¹, or an associate of the practitioner,¹ having performed an
 5 assessment of the physical or mental condition of the patient or client
 6 necessary to determine the appropriate course of treatment.

7 (2) The falsity, fictitiousness, fraudulence or misleading nature of
 8 a statement ¹[is presumed] may be inferred by the trier of fact¹ in the
 9 case of a person who attempts to submit, submits, causes to be
 10 submitted, or attempts to cause to be submitted any record, bill, claim
 11 or other document for more treatments or procedures than can be
 12 performed during the time in which the treatments or procedures were
 13 represented to have been performed.

14 (3) ¹[Proof that a person has made three or more separate false
 15 statements in a record, bill, claim or other document without that
 16 person having made a reasonable inquiry as to the truthfulness of each
 17 statement shall give rise to the presumption that the person knew each
 18 statement was false.

19 (4)¹ Proof that a practitioner has ¹[made a material statement that
 20 appears in] signed or initialed¹ a record, bill, claim or other document
 21 ¹[shall give] gives¹ rise to ¹[the presumption] an inference¹ that the
 22 practitioner ¹[is aware of the truth or falsity of the statement, and
 23 intends that the statement be taken as true] has read and reviewed that
 24 record, bill, claim or other document¹.

25 g. ¹In order to promote the uniform enforcement of this act, the
 26 Attorney General shall develop health care claims fraud prosecution
 27 guidelines and disseminate them to the county prosecutors within 120
 28 days of the effective date of this act.

29 h. For the purposes of this section, a person acts recklessly with
 30 respect to a material element of an offense when he consciously
 31 disregards a substantial and unjustifiable risk that the material element
 32 exists or will result from his conduct. The risk must be of such a
 33 nature and degree that, considering the nature and purpose of the
 34 actor's conduct and the circumstances known to him, its disregard
 35 involves a gross deviation from the standard of conduct that a
 36 reasonable person would observe in the actor's situation.

37 i. (1)¹ Nothing in this act shall preclude an indictment and
 38 conviction for any other offense defined by the laws of this State.

39 ¹(2) Nothing in this act shall preclude an assignment judge from
 40 dismissing a prosecution of health care claims fraud if the assignment
 41 judge determines, pursuant to N.J.S. 2C:2-11, the conduct charged to
 42 be a de minimis infraction.¹

 44 ¹[3] ⁴¹. a. (1) A practitioner convicted of health care claims fraud
 45 pursuant to subsection a. of section ¹[2] ³¹ of P.L. , c. (C.)
 46 (pending before the Legislature as this bill) or a substantially similar

1 crime under the laws of another state or the United States shall forfeit
2 his ¹[or her]¹ license and be forever barred from the practice of the
3 profession ¹unless the court finds that such license forfeiture would be
4 a serious injustice which overrides the need to deter such conduct by
5 others and in such case the court shall determine an appropriate period
6 of license suspension which shall be for a period not less than one
7 year. If the court does not permanently forfeit such license pursuant
8 to this paragraph, the sentence shall not become final for 10 days in
9 order to permit the appeal of such sentence by the prosecution¹.

10 (2) Upon a first conviction of health care claims fraud pursuant to
11 subsection b. of section ¹[2] ³¹ of P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before
12 the Legislature as this bill) or a substantially similar crime under the
13 laws of another state or the United States, a practitioner shall have his
14 ¹[or her]¹ license suspended and be barred from the practice of the
15 profession for a period of at least one year.

16 (3) Upon a second conviction of health care claims fraud pursuant
17 to subsection b. of section ¹[2] ³¹ of P.L. , c. (C.) (pending
18 before the Legislature as this bill) or a substantially similar crime under
19 the laws of another state or the United States, a practitioner shall
20 forfeit his ¹[or her]¹ license and be forever barred from the practice
21 of the profession.

22 b. A court of this State shall enter an order of license forfeiture
23 or suspension pursuant to subsection a. of this section:

24 (1) Immediately upon a finding of guilt by the trier of fact or a plea
25 of guilty entered in any court of this State; or

26 (2) Upon application of the county prosecutor or the Attorney
27 General, when the license forfeiture or suspension is based upon a
28 conviction of an offense under the laws of another state or of the
29 United States. An order of license forfeiture or suspension pursuant
30 to this paragraph shall be effective as of the date the person is found
31 guilty by the trier of fact or pleads guilty to the offense.

32 This application may also be made in the alternative by the Attorney
33 General to the appropriate licensing agency.

34 The court shall provide notice of the forfeiture or suspension to the
35 appropriate licensing agency within 10 days of the date an order of
36 forfeiture or suspension is entered.

37 c. No court shall grant a stay of an order of license forfeiture or
38 suspension pending appeal of a conviction or forfeiture or suspension
39 order unless the court is clearly convinced that there is a substantial
40 likelihood of success on the merits. If the conviction is reversed or
41 the order of license forfeiture or suspension is overturned, the ¹court
42 shall provide notice of reinstatement to the appropriate licensing
43 agency within 10 days of the date of the order of reinstatement. The¹
44 license shall be restored, in accordance with applicable procedures,
45 unless the appropriate licensing agency determines to suspend or
46 revoke the license.

1 d. In any case in which the issue of license forfeiture or
2 suspension is not raised in a court of this State at the time of a finding
3 of guilt, entry of a guilty plea or sentencing, a license forfeiture or
4 suspension required by this section may be ordered by a court or by
5 the appropriate licensing agency of this State upon application of the
6 county prosecutor or the Attorney General or upon application of the
7 appropriate licensing agency having authority to revoke or suspend the
8 professional's license. The fact that a court has declined to order
9 license forfeiture or suspension shall not preclude the appropriate
10 licensing agency having authority to revoke or suspend the
11 professional's license from seeking to do so on the ground that the
12 conduct giving rise to the conviction demonstrates that the person is
13 unfit to hold the license or is otherwise liable for an offense as
14 specified in section 8 of P.L.1978, c.73 (C.45:1-21).

15 e. If the Supreme Court of the State of New Jersey issues Rules
16 of Court pursuant to this act, the Supreme Court may revoke the
17 license to practice law of any attorney who has been convicted, under
18 the laws of this State, of health care claims fraud pursuant to section
19 ¹[2] 3¹ of P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this
20 bill), or an offense which, if committed in this State, would constitute
21 health care claims fraud.

22 f. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent or limit the
23 appropriate licensing agency or any other party from taking any other
24 action permitted by law against the practitioner.

26 ¹5. a. If an order of expungement of records of conviction under the
27 provisions of chapter 52 of Title 2C of the New Jersey Statutes is
28 granted by the court to a person convicted of health care claims fraud
29 in which the court had ordered the offender's professional license be
30 forfeited and the person be forever barred from the practice of the
31 profession pursuant to paragraph (1) of subsection a. of section 4 of
32 P.L. c. (C.)(now pending before the Legislature as this bill), the
33 person may petition the court for an order to rescind the court's order
34 of debarment if the person can demonstrate that the person is
35 sufficiently rehabilitated.

36 b. If an order to rescind the court's order of debarment is
37 granted, the person granted the order may apply to be licensed to
38 practice the profession from which the offender was barred.¹

39
40 ¹6. If any provision of this act, or an application of any provision is
41 held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other applications of the
42 provision or other provisions of the act which reasonably can be given
43 effect despite the invalidity.¹

44
45 ¹[4.] 7.¹ This act shall take effect immediately.

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3 Makes health care claims fraud a criminal offense and provides for
4 forfeiture of professional licenses in certain instances.
