# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED NOVEMBER 18, 1996

## **By Senators KYRILLOS and SINAGRA**

1   **AN ACT** permitting the Attorney General to recover costs in certain  
2       consumer fraud actions and amending P.L.1971, c.247.

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4       **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State  
5   of New Jersey:

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7       1. Section 7 of P.L.1971, c.247 (C.56:8-19) is amended to read  
8 as follows:

9       7. Any person who suffers any ascertainable loss of moneys or  
10 property, real or personal, as a result of the use or employment by  
11 another person of any method, act, or practice declared unlawful  
12 under this act or the act hereby amended and supplemented may bring  
13 an action or assert a counterclaim therefor in any court of competent  
14 jurisdiction. In any action under this section the court shall, in  
15 addition to any other appropriate legal or equitable relief, award  
16 threefold the damages sustained by any person in interest. In all  
17 actions under this section, including those brought by the Attorney  
18 General, the court shall also award reasonable attorneys' fees, filing  
19 fees and reasonable costs of suit.

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22        2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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## STATEMENT

27 This bill amends current law to allow the State to recover  
28 reasonable costs of suit, including attorneys' and filing fees, for  
29 successful actions brought by the Attorney General under the  
30 consumer fraud law. While currently the court may award costs of  
31 suit to private litigants who successfully sue under this law, the State  
32 must absorb its court costs regardless of the outcome of a case.

33 The Division of Consumer Affairs currently spends \$12.5 million  
34 annually on protecting consumer rights and investigating consumer

1 complaints, including \$1.0 million on court costs directly related to the  
2 enforcement of the consumer fraud law. This bill would provide the  
3 State with the same opportunity for recovery of such costs as is  
4 afforded to private litigants by making violators of the law potentially  
5 liable for actions brought on behalf of the public by the Attorney  
6 General.
