1	A SENATE RESOLUTION requesting the Senate Budget and Appropriations
2	Committee to maintain the Bureau of Emergency Response in the
3	Department of Environmental Protection at its Fiscal Year 1996 budget
4	and staffing level.
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6	WHEREAS, The Bureau of Emergency Response in the Department of
7	Environmental Protection is the front-line State agency responsible for
8	immediate on-site response to spills and discharges of oil and hazardous
9	substances, chemical plant explosions and fires, and train derailments, and
10	for oversight of the cleanup of such environmental disasters by private
11	contractors; and
12	WHEREAS, New Jersey, with its many miles of exposed shorelines, and its
13	location in the midst of a huge concentration of the petro-chemical industry,
14	is especially dependent on a first-rate emergency response capability, and
15	over the years the Bureau of Emergency Response has never failed to fill
16	this important role; and
17	WHEREAS, The recent 40,000 gallon oil spill in the waters off the beaches of
18	Cape May and Atlantic Counties was the most recent example of the
19	State's vulnerability to oil spills and its need for a well trained and
20	experienced emergency response team; and
21	WHEREAS, The Governor's proposed Fiscal Year 1997 budget potentially
22	would reduce the number of emergency response specialists in the Bureau
23	of Emergency Response from 16 to 13, which, when the effects of
24	"bumping" are taken into account, may leave the Bureau with less than ten
25	experienced emergency response specialists, all at a time when the annual
26	number of environmental emergencies requiring the Bureau's response is
27	increasing; now, therefore,
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29	BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of New Jersey:
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31	1. The Senate of the State of New Jersey finds that the proposed Fiscal
32	Year Reductions in the staffing levels of the Bureau of Emergency Response
33	in the Department of environmental Protection would seriously weaken the
34	State's ability to respond to environmental disasters, and therefore the Senate
35	Budget and Appropriations Committee is requested to restore the Bureau of

1	Emergency Response in the Department of Environmental Protection to its
2	Fiscal Year 1996 staffing level.
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4	2. A duly authenticated copy of this resolution, signed by the President of
5	the Senate and attested to by the Secretary thereof, shall be transmitted to the
6	Governor, the State Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the Department of
7	Environmental Protection.
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10	STATEMENT
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12	This Senate Resolution would request the Senate Budget and
13	Appropriations Committee to restore the Bureau of Emergency Response in
14	the Department of Environmental Protection to its Fiscal Year 1996 staffing
15	level. The Governor's proposed Fiscal Year 1997 Budget potentially would
16	reduce the staffing level from 16 to 13, which would leave the State
17	inadequately prepared to respond to an environmental disaster.
