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### SYNOPSIS

Establishes "Student Mental Health Task Force.

### **CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT**

As reported by the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee on June 17, 2021, with amendments.

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AN ACT establishing the "Student Mental Health Task Force." 1 2 3 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 4 of New Jersey: 5 There is established the "Student Mental Health Task 6 1. a. Force." The purpose of the task force shall be to <sup>2</sup>examine issues 7 related to the mental health of students, including depression, anxiety, 8 9 stress, or other psychological or emotional tension, trauma, or disorder;<sup>2</sup> study and survey the resources that are available to schools 10 and parents to address student mental health needs <sup>2</sup>; and develop 11 recommendations to ensure that students have access to mental health 12 care programs and services in order to allow students to meet their 13 14 educational goals<sup>2</sup>. b. The task force shall consist of  ${}^{2}$  [15]  $17^{2}$  members, as follows: 15 (1) the Commissioner of Education, or a designee, who shall 16 17 serve ex officio; (2) the Commissioner of Health, or a designee, who shall serve ex 18 19 officio; (3) the Commissioner of Children and Families, or a designee, 20 21 who shall serve ex officio; (4) the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, or a designee, 22 23 who shall serve ex officio; 24 (5) the Director of the Division of Mental Health and Addiction 25 Services in the Department of Human Services, or a designee, who 26 shall serve ex officio; (6) one public member <sup>2</sup>[with knowledge in issues relating to the 27 work of the task force, **]**<sup>2</sup> appointed by the Speaker of the General 28 Assembly <sup>2</sup> and one public member appointed by the Minority Leader 29 of the General Assembly, both of whom shall have demonstrated 30 expertise in issues relating to the work of the task force<sup>2</sup>; 31 (7) one public member <sup>2</sup> [with knowledge in issues relating to the 32 work of the task force, ]<sup>2</sup> appointed by the Senate President <sup>2</sup>and one 33 public member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate, both 34 of whom shall have demonstrated expertise in issues related to the 35 36 work of the task force<sup>2</sup>; and (8) eight public members appointed by the Governor, who shall 37 include: one representative of <sup>1</sup>[the New Jersey Principals and 38 39 Supervisors Association]<sup>2</sup>[an organization representing school] district leaders in the State<sup>1</sup>] the New Jersey Principals and 40 Supervisors Association<sup>2</sup>, one representative of <sup>1</sup>[the New Jersey 41 School Boards Association]<sup>2</sup>[an organization representing local 42 boards of education in the State<sup>1</sup>] the New Jersey School Boards 43 <u>Association</u><sup>2</sup>, one representative of the National Alliance on Mental 44

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1 Illness, one representative of the New Jersey Association of Mental 2 Health and Addiction Agencies, one representative of the New Jersey 3 Association of Counties, one representative of the New Jersey League of Municipalities, <sup>2</sup>[one representative of a mental health service 4 provider that has entered into a partnership with one or more school 5 6 districts in the State, and one representative of any State institution of 7 higher education that has entered into a mental health-related 8 partnership with one or more school districts in the State <u>one member</u> 9 representing school district leaders, and one school mental health 10 professional who holds a valid educational services certificate issued 11 by the State Board of Examiners that may include, but is not limited 12 to, a school counselor, a school social worker, or a school 13 psychologist<sup>2</sup>. 14 c. Members to the task force shall be appointed within 60 days 15 following the date of enactment of this act. The Commissioner of

Education, or his designee, shall serve as the chairperson of the task force. The task force shall organize as soon as practicable following the appointment of its members and shall select a vice-chairperson from among its members. The chairperson shall appoint a secretary who need not be a member of the task force.

d. Vacancies in the membership of the task force shall be filled in
the same manner as the original appointments were made. Members
of the task force shall serve without compensation, but shall be
reimbursed for necessary expenditures incurred in the performance of
their duties as members of the task force, subject to available funds.

e. The Department of Education shall provide such administrative
and professional assistance as is necessary for the task force to carry
out its work. The task force shall be entitled to call to its assistance
and avail itself of the services of the employees of any State agency as
it may require and as may be available for its purposes.

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2. a. It shall be the duty of the task force to  $\frac{2}{\text{examine issues}}$ 32 related to the mental health of students, including depression, anxiety, 33 stress, or other psychological or emotional tension, trauma, or 34 disorder;<sup>2</sup> study and survey all resources that are currently available to 35 the schools and parents within each county in the State, and within the 36 northern, central, and southern regions of the State, for helping a 37 student or child who experiences mental health issues <sup>2</sup>; and develop 38 39 recommendations to ensure that students have access to mental health care programs and services in order to allow students to meet their 40 educational goals<sup>2</sup>. 41

<sup>2</sup><u>b.<sup>2</sup></u> The task force shall, at a minimum, survey the availability of:
(1) mental health treatment services provided within each county
and region of the State including, but not limited to, those services
provided through a school district, professional mental health services
provider, or community mental health services organization, and any
other tools or resources to address the mental health needs of students;

(2) mental health care provider networks that offer mental health

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2 treatment services within each municipality, county, and region of the 3 State: 4 (3) State, county, or municipal agencies within each county and 5 region of the State that offer funding, professional mental health 6 treatment services, or other resources to address the mental health 7 needs of students; and 8 (4) partnership opportunities with institutions of higher education 9 within each county and region of the State to address the mental health 10 needs of students. <sup>2</sup>[b.] c. The task force shall also study and make 11 recommendations regarding the following: 12 13 (1) the identification of public school students who experience 14 depression, anxiety, stress, or other psychological or emotional 15 tension, trauma, or disorder; 16 (2) the evaluation and expansion of counseling programs and 17 services available to students experiencing mental health difficulties, and other programs designed to address issues related to student 18 19 mental health; 20 (3) the relationship of student mental health to school safety and 21 security; 22 (4) the amount of funding that may be necessary for public schools 23 to employ the appropriate staff and to establish new programs or 24 expand existing programs necessary to address student mental health; 25 (5) an examination of other states that have implemented programs 26 that have successfully addressed depression, anxiety, stress, or other 27 psychological or emotional tension, trauma, or disorder among public

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 28 school students and reduced the number of students experiencing such
 29 difficulties; and
 30 (6) any other proposals that the task force determines would

31 provide for increased access to high-quality mental health programs.

<u>d.</u> The task force shall consult with parents of general education
 <u>students</u>, parents of students who receive special education and related
 <u>services</u>, and teaching staff members when performing the duties
 <u>required</u> pursuant to the provisions of this section.

36 <u>e.</u><sup>2</sup> The task force shall issue a final report to the Governor, and to 37 the Legislature pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-38 19.1), no later than one year after the organization of the task force. 39 The report shall contain the results of the survey required <sup>2</sup>and 40 recommendations developed<sup>2</sup> pursuant to <sup>2</sup>[subsection a. of]<sup>2</sup> this 41 section.

42 The task force shall forward a copy of the report to every school43 district in the State.

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45 3. This act shall take effect immediately, and shall expire 3046 days after the task force issues its final report.
