# A5524 BRAMNICK, MURPHY

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AN ACT concerning the use of portable anti-choking devices in
 schools and supplementing chapter 40 of Title 18A of the New
 Jersey Statutes.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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8 1. Each board of education of a public school district and the 9 governing board or chief school administrator of a nonpublic school 10 in the State shall ensure that at least one portable anti-choking 11 device is made available in the cafeteria, the office of the school 12 nurse, and any other similar location. The devices shall be placed in unlocked and easily accessible locations during the school day 13 14 and at any other time when a school-sponsored event is taking 15 place. The locations of each device shall have an appropriate 16 identifying sign.

As used in this act, "portable anti-choking device" means a portable medical device that uses manually created suction to remove blockage from the airway during a choking emergency and has been registered as a Class II acute upper airway obstruction device with the United States Food and Drug Administration.

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23 2. Each board of education and the governing board or chief 24 administrator of a nonpublic school shall develop policies for the 25 use of portable anti-choking devices by school nurses and school 26 employees. The policies shall include a requirement that all school 27 nurses and school employees receive training in airway 28 management and in the removal of any obstruction from the airway 29 using a portable anti-choking device.

31 3. The Commissioner of Education shall ensure that annual
32 educational opportunities are made available for school nurses and
33 employees of both public and nonpublic schools regarding airway
34 management and the use of portable anti-choking devices.

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4. The Department of Education shall provide for the 36 37 reimbursement of the costs incurred by school districts and nonpublic schools in implementing the provisions of this act. The 38 39 department shall establish procedures by which a school district or 40 nonpublic school may apply for reimbursement pursuant to this 41 section. The department is authorized to accept contributions of funds from private or nonprofit entities in order to defray the 42 expenses of the State in reimbursing public and nonpublic schools 43 44 pursuant to this section.

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46 5. This act shall take effect on the 180th day after enactment,47 but the Commissioner of Education may take such anticipatory

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administrative action in advance as necessary for the timely
 implementation of this act.

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## STATEMENT

7 This bill would require public and nonpublic schools to ensure 8 that at least one portable anti-choking device is made available in 9 the cafeteria, school nurse's office, and any other similar location. 10 The devices would be placed in an unlocked and easily accessible 11 location during the school day and at any other time when a school-12 sponsored event is taking place. The locations of each portable 13 anti-choking device shall have an appropriate identifying sign. A 14 portable anti-choking device is a device that uses manually created 15 suction to remove blockage from a person's airway during a 16 choking emergency. These devices may only be used in schools 17 provided they have been registered with the United States Food and 18 Drug Administration.

19 Each board of education and the governing board or chief 20 administrator of a nonpublic school would be required to develop policies for the use of anti-choking devices by school nurses and 21 22 school employees. The policies would include a requirement that 23 all school nurses and school employees receive training in airway 24 management and in the removal of any obstructions from the airway 25 using a portable anti-choking device. The Commissioner of 26 Education would ensure that annual educational opportunities are 27 made available for school nurses and employees of both public and 28 nonpublic schools regarding airway management and the use of 29 portable anti-choking devices.

The Department of Education would reimburse public and
nonpublic schools for the costs incurred to implement the
provisions of this bill.
