

SYNOPSIS

Appropriates \$300 million to EDA for small business and not-for-profit corporation assistance to preserve and create jobs, spur economic growth, and preserve the viability and vitality of communities.

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1 AN ACT allocating funding to the New Jersey Economic 2 Development Authority for certain small business and not-for-3 profit corporation assistance, and making an appropriation. 4 5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 6 of New Jersey: 7 8 1. a. The Legislature finds and declares that: 9 (1) The negative effects of the coronavirus disease 2019 10 pandemic (COVID-19) have resulted in thousands of established 11 small businesses and (501)(c)(3) not-for-profit associations, 12 corporations, and organizations (nonprofits) suspending their 13 operations or scaling back their ability to serve customers and 14 remain viable, and led to some closing permanently; 15 (2) COVID-19 has significantly disrupted the otherwise 16 previously viable plans of small businesses and nonprofits that had 17 only recently opened, or had planned to open, early in 2020; (3) The impact of COVID-19 has resulted not only in hardships 18 19 for small businesses and nonprofits, but has affected the viability 20 and vitality of "main streets" and other locales where small businesses and nonprofits serve customers, meet community needs, 21 22 and create "livable communities"; 23 (4) Prior State and federal governmental programs providing 24 assistance to small business and nonprofits proved to be of only 25 limited value due to overly restrictive program eligibility 26 requirements and caps on the amount of financial assistance 27 provided under these programs; (5) Small businesses and nonprofits seeking to reopen, ramp up, 28 29 or resume full operations will face a difficult and uncertain 30 economic climate as the State slowly recovers from the economic, 31 fiscal, and healthcare impact of COVID-19; and 32 (6) There will be significant additional closures of small businesses and nonprofits leading to further job losses, reduced 33 economic activity, fewer services, and the deterioration of "main 34 35 streets" and "livable communities" without significant additional assistance provided to small businesses and nonprofits. 36 37 b. The Legislature therefore determines that an appropriation of 38 \$300 million to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority 39 will allow the authority's grant, loan, and loan guarantee programs to meet the unmet Statewide needs of small businesses and 40 41 nonprofits in order to preserve and create jobs, spur economic activity, provide services, and have a positive effect on the viability 42 43 and vitality of "main streets" and other locales where small 44 businesses and nonprofits serve customers, meet community needs, and create "livable communities." 45 46 47 There is appropriated from the General Fund, to the New 2

48 Jersey Economic Development Authority the sum of \$300 million

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1 for use by the authority to provide financial support, such as loans, 2 loan guarantees, and grants, to small businesses and (501)(c)(3) not-3 for-profit organizations whose revenues or budgets were significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and to small 4 5 businesses and (501)(c)(3) not-for-profit organizations that preserve or create jobs, provide needed services, preserve or revitalize 6 7 communities, or fill vacant storefronts or occupy under-utilized 8 space. 9 10 3. When expanding existing or creating new authority 11 assistance programs with the funds appropriated pursuant to section 12 2 of this act, the authority shall do so with a sense of urgency to 13 prevent additional small business and nonprofit organization closures, to preserve and create jobs, and to spur economic 14 15 recovery. Among other assistance program provisions that the 16 authority may adopt, the authority shall adopt provisions providing 17 for:

18 a. the availability of program assistance Statewide;

b. eligibility for small businesses and nonprofit organizations
that employed no more than 50 full-time employees in the previous
three months and have lost revenue due to the COVID-19
pandemic;

c. eligibility for new or existing small businesses and nonprofit
 organizations that preserve or create jobs, preserve or revitalize
 communities, provide needed services, or fill vacant stores or
 occupy under-utilized space;

d. sufficiently higher caps on maximum grant or loan supportto make the assistance meaningful for applicants;

e. the simplicity of applications with rolling applicationperiods and adequate application submission deadlines;

f. the ability and resources of the authority to promptly review
and approve applications and expend funds in those instances where
awards are made;

g. reasonable flexibility in the use of grants or loans; and

h. an affirmative marketing and outreach effort by the authority
to publicize assistance to small businesses and nonprofit
organizations.

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4. This act shall take effect immediately.

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STATEMENT

This bill appropriates \$300 million from the General Fund to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (EDA) for use by the EDA to provide financial support, such as loans, loan guarantees, and grants, to small businesses and (501)(c)(3) not-for-profit organizations (nonprofits) whose revenues or budgets were 1 significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and to small 2 businesses and nonprofits that preserve or create jobs, provide 3 needed services, preserve or revitalize communities, or fill vacant 4 stores or occupy under-utilized space.

5 The bill provides that, when expanding existing or creating new 6 EDA assistance programs with the funds appropriated pursuant to 7 the bill, the EDA is to do so with a sense of urgency to prevent 8 additional small business and nonprofit closures. Among other 9 assistance program provisions that the EDA may adopt, the EDA is 10 to adopt provisions providing for:

11 1) the availability of program assistance Statewide;

12 2) eligibility for small businesses and nonprofit organizations 13 that employed no more than 50 full-time employees on their payroll 14 for the previous three months and have lost revenue due to the 15 COVID-19 pandemic;

16 3) eligibility for new or existing small businesses and nonprofit 17 organizations that preserve or create jobs, preserve or revitalize 18 communities, provide needed services, or fill vacant stores or 19 occupy under-utilized space;

20 4) higher caps on maximum grant or loan support to make the 21 assistance meaningful for applicants;

22 5) the simplicity of applications with rolling application 23 periods and adequate application submission deadlines;

24 6) the ability and resources of the EDA to promptly review and 25 approve applications and expend funds in those instances where 26 awards are made;

27 7) reasonable flexibility in the use of grants or loans; and

28 8) an affirmative marketing and outreach effort by the EDA to 29 publicize assistance to small businesses and nonprofits.
