#### **SYNOPSIS**

Establishes Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey Grant Program in DOE to assist public schools in establishing or expanding certain educational programs to address learning loss in students.

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1 AN ACT establishing the Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey 2 Grant Program in the Department of Education. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. The Legislature finds and declares that: 8 a. The COVID-19 pandemic and the associated increase in the 9 use of virtual and remote instruction have profoundly impacted 10 elementary and secondary school students across the State in many 11 ways. 12 b. While the provision of instruction through the use of virtual 13 or remote technologies in a full-time or hybrid manner has been necessary to limit student and staff exposure to COVID-19, one 14 15 significant effect of decreasing in-person instruction is learning loss 16 experienced by students. 17 c. Research has shown that, although online learning can 18 provide many opportunities and benefits to students, it is generally not as effective in achieving similar levels of academic 19 20 achievement, when compared to in-person instruction delivered in a 21 classroom setting. 22 d. The difference between the overall efficacy of in-person 23 instruction and that of online instruction is exacerbated if students 24 do not have consistent or reliable access to the Internet and the 25 electronic devices needed to complete online work. 26 e. In addition to the gap in potential learning gains stemming 27 from online learning versus in-person instruction, the use of virtual or remote instruction also can hinder the development of students' 28 29 social and emotional skills as they may not have as much face-to-30 face contact with their friends and fellow classmates and as their 31 participation in extracurricular activities may be reduced. f. Several preliminary studies and projections of learning loss 32 33 conducted by education experts and research organizations have 34 indicated that students may, on average, lose several months of overall learning as the use of virtual or remote instruction 35 continues. The learning loss experienced by a student may be more 36 37 acute depending on a number of factors, including the student's grade level, race, and income level and the quality of online 38 39 instruction and subject area. 40 Although education communities across the State have g. 41 rapidly and commendably transformed the way in which they deliver education to students, it is fitting and proper that school 42 districts, charter schools, and renaissance schools are afforded more 43 44 resources and supports to address learning loss resulting from the 45 proliferated use of virtual and remote instruction. 46 47 There is established in the Department of Education the 2. Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey Grant Program. 48 The

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purpose of the grant program shall be to provide funds to school districts, charter schools, and renaissance schools for the creation or expansion of summer learning programs during the summer of 2021 and other student support programs during the 2021-2022 school year, which seek to mitigate student learning loss resulting from COVID-19 related school closures or the use of virtual or remote instruction.

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9 A school district, charter school, or renaissance school 3 10 seeking funds under the Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey Grant Program shall submit an application to the Commissioner of 11 12 Education in accordance with application procedures and 13 requirements prescribed by the commissioner. The grants shall be 14 awarded on a competitive basis in amounts to be determined by the 15 commissioner upon review of applications submitted by districts or 16 schools. When selecting the recipients of grant funds under the 17 program, the commissioner shall give priority to school districts, 18 charter schools, and renaissance schools that:

a. have not established for the summer of 2021 a summerlearning program; and

b. have a student population in which 20 percent or more of the
students enrolled in the district or school are eligible for free or
reduced price meals under the National School Lunch Program or
the federal School Breakfast Program.

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4. An application submitted to the Commissioner of Educationpursuant to section 3 of this act shall include:

a. a general description of the summer learning program to be
established or expanded for the summer of 2021 or of any other
student support program to be established or expanded for the 20212022 school year. The general description shall, at a minimum,
detail how the creation or expansion of a program will address
learning loss resulting from COVID-19 related school closures or
the use of virtual or remote instruction;

b. details on any instruction and other learning supports andservices that will be provided to students participating in a program;

c. a description of any integrated services and supports that may
be provided to participating students including, but not limited to,
meals and health, counseling, and mental health services;

d. information concerning any compensatory services that maybe provided to students with disabilities under the programs;

e. details concerning any efforts, including the use of diagnostic
tools and assessments, that have been or will be undertaken by the
school district, charter school, or renaissance school to measure the
level of learning loss among participating students or the student
population at large;

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f. how the instruction and other services and supports provided
 to students participating in a summer learning program may be
 continued during the 2021-2022 school year;

g. a description of any student eligibility criteria or prioritization
under a program detailed in the application;

h. an estimate of the number of students who will participate in
a program to be established or expanded during the summer of 2021
or the 2021-2022 school year, as applicable;

9 i. an estimate of the total cost associated with establishing or10 expanding a program; and

j. any other information as required by the commissioner to
evaluate the effectiveness of a proposed program creation or
expansion in addressing student learning loss.

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5. To the extent permitted by federal law, the grants awarded pursuant to section 3 of this act shall be paid from the monies received by the State under the federal "Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act," Pub.L.116-136, or any other financial assistance provided by the federal government to address the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on elementary and secondary schools.

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23 6. Notwithstanding any provision of P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-24 1 et seq.), or any other law to the contrary, the Commissioner of 25 Education may adopt, immediately upon filing with the Office of 26 Administrative Law and no later than the 90th day after the 27 effective date of this act, such rules and regulations as the commissioner deems necessary to implement the provisions of this 28 29 act, which regulations shall be effective for a period not to exceed 30 12 months. The regulations shall thereafter be amended, adopted, 31 or readopted by the commissioner in accordance with the provisions of P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.). 32

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7. This act shall take effect immediately.

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## STATEMENT

39 This bill establishes in the Department of Education the 40 Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey Grant Program. The 41 purpose of the grant program is to provide funds to school districts, 42 charter schools, and renaissance schools for the creation or expansion of summer learning programs and other student support 43 44 programs during the summer of 2021 and the 2021-2022 school 45 year. The programs are to address student learning loss resulting 46 from the COVID-19 related school closures or the use of virtual or 47 remote instruction.

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1 A school district, charter school, or renaissance school seeking 2 funds under the Alleviating Learning Loss in New Jersey Grant 3 Program is required to submit an application to the Commissioner 4 of Education. When selecting districts or schools for funding under 5 the grant program, the commissioner is required to give priority to 6 school districts, charter schools, and renaissance schools that: 1) 7 have not established for the summer of 2021 a summer learning 8 program; and 2) have a student population in which 20 percent or 9 more of the students enrolled in the district or school are eligible for 10 free or reduced price meals under the National School Lunch 11 Program or the federal School Breakfast Program.

12 Under the bill, an application submitted to the commissioner will include a general description of a summer learning program to be 13 14 established or expanded for the summer of 2021 or of any other 15 student support program to be established or expanded for the 2021-16 2022 school year. The general description will, at a minimum, 17 detail how the creation or expansion of a program will address 18 learning loss resulting from COVID-19 related school closures or 19 the use of virtual or remote instruction. An application will also 20 detail the instruction, learning supports and services, and other 21 integrated supports and services that will be provided to 22 participating students. Further, an application will include: a 23 description of any student eligibility criteria or prioritization under 24 a program; an estimate of the number of students who will 25 participate in a program to be established or expanded during the 26 summer of 2021 or the 2021-2022 school year, as applicable; and an 27 estimate of the total cost associated with establishing or expanding 28 a program.

To the extent permitted by federal law, grants awarded under the grant program would be paid from the monies received by the State under the federal "Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act" or any other financial assistance provided by the federal government to address the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on elementary and secondary schools.
