SYNOPSIS

Authorizes issuance of Operation Desert Storm license plates.

CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT

As introduced.



AN ACT authorizing the issuance of Operation Desert Storm license plates and supplementing Title 39 of the Revised Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. a. Upon proper application, the Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission shall issue Operation Desert Storm license plates for any motor vehicle owned or leased and registered in this State. In addition to the registration number and other markings or identification otherwise prescribed by law, the license plate shall display the words and images that honor the members of the military that served in Operation Desert Storm. The chief administrator, in consultation with the Adjutant General of the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs, shall select the design of the Operation Desert Storm license plates. The Operation Desert Storm license plates shall be subject to the provisions of chapter 3 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes, except as hereinafter otherwise specifically provided.
- b. Application for issuance of Operation Desert Storm license plates shall be made to the chief administrator on forms and in a manner prescribed by the chief administrator. The application shall include proof satisfactory to the chief administrator that the applicant served in Operation Desert Storm as certified on the applicant's DD-214 form or on a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. In order to be deemed complete, an application shall be accompanied by a fee of \$50, payable to the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission, which shall be in addition to the fee otherwise prescribed by law for the registration of motor vehicles. The chief administrator shall collect annually, subsequent to the year of issuance of the Operation Desert Storm license plate, a \$10 fee for the license plate in addition to the fee otherwise prescribed by law for the registration of a motor vehicle. The additional fees required by this subsection shall be deposited in the "Operation Desert Storm License Plate Fund" created pursuant to subsection c. of this section.
- c. There is created in the Department of the Treasury a special non-lapsing fund to be known as the "Operation Desert Storm License Plate Fund." There shall be deposited in the fund the amount collected from all license plate fees collected pursuant to subsection b. of this section, less the amounts necessary to reimburse the commission for administrative costs pursuant to subsection d. of this section. Monies deposited in the fund shall be appropriated annually to the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs and shall be used to support programs benefiting combat veterans. Monies deposited in the fund shall be held in interest-bearing accounts in public depositories as defined

- 2 invested or reinvested in securities approved by the State Treasurer.
- 3 Interest or other income earned on monies deposited into the fund,
- 4 and any monies which may be appropriated or otherwise become
- 5 available for the purposes of the fund, shall be credited to and
- 6 deposited in the fund for use as set forth in P.L. , c. (C.)
- 7 (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

- d. Prior to the deposit of the additional fees collected pursuant to subsection b. of this section into the "Operation Desert Storm License Plate Fund," amounts thereof as are necessary shall be used to reimburse the commission for all costs reasonably and actually incurred, as stipulated by the chief administrator, for:
- (1) designing, producing, issuing, renewing, and publicizing the availability of the Operation Desert Storm license plates; and
- (2) any computer programming changes that may be initially necessary to implement the Operation Desert Storm license plate program established by P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill), in an amount not to exceed \$150,000.
- The chief administrator shall annually certify to the State Treasurer the average cost per license plate incurred in the immediately preceding year by the commission in producing, issuing, renewing, and publicizing the availability of the Operation Desert Storm license plates. The annual certification of the average cost per license plate shall be approved by the Joint Budget Oversight Committee, or its successor.
- In the event that the average cost per license plate as certified by the chief administrator and approved by the Joint Budget Oversight Committee, or its successor, is greater than the \$50 application fee established in subsection b. of this section in two consecutive fiscal years, the chief administrator may discontinue the issuance of Operation Desert Storm license plates.
- e. The chief administrator shall notify eligible motorists of the opportunity to obtain Operation Desert Storm license plates by publicizing the availability of the license plates on the website of the commission. The New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs, and any other individual or entity designated by the department, may publicize the availability of the Operation Desert Storm license plates in any manner that the department deems appropriate.
- f. The chief administrator and adjutant general shall develop and enter into an interdepartmental memorandum of agreement setting forth the procedures to be followed in carrying out their respective responsibilities under P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).
- g. The adjutant general shall appoint a representative who shall act as a liaison between the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs and the commission. The liaison shall represent

the department in any and all communications with the commission regarding the Operation Desert Storm license plates established by P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

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- 2. a. State or public funds shall not be used by the commission for the initial cost of:
- (1) designing, producing, issuing, and publicizing the availability of Operation Desert Storm license plates; or
- (2) any computer programming changes which may be necessary to implement the Operation Desert Storm license plate program established by P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).
- 13 b. An individual or entity designated by the New Jersey 14 Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs shall contribute non-15 public monies in an amount to be determined by the chief 16 administrator, not to exceed a total of \$25,000, to be used to offset 17 the initial costs incurred by the commission for designing, 18 producing, issuing, and publicizing the availability of Operation 19 Desert Storm license plates, and any computer programming which 20 may be necessary to implement the program. 21 organizations and individual donors may contribute monies to the 22 department to be used to offset the initial costs incurred by the 23 commission for the Operation Desert Storm license plates 24 authorized by P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the 25 Legislature as this bill). Any amount remaining after the payment 26 of the initial cost shall be deposited in the "Operation Desert Storm 27 License Plate Fund" established pursuant to subsection c. of section 28 1 of P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this 29 bill).
 - c. The commission shall not begin designing, producing, issuing, or publicizing the availability of the Operation Desert Storm license plates, or making any necessary programming changes, until the following requirements have been met:
 - (1) The individual or entity designated by the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs has provided the commission with the non-public monies necessary, as determined by the chief administrator pursuant to subsection b. of this section, to offset the initial costs incurred by the commission in establishing the Operation Desert Storm license plate program; and
 - (2) The liaison appointed by the Adjutant General pursuant to subsection g. of section 1 of P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill) has provided the commission with not less than 500 completed applications for the Operation Desert Storm license plates. These applications shall constitute the initial order for the Operation Desert Storm license plates and shall be accompanied by a fee representing the total cost of the initial order. The fee shall be determined by multiplying the number of sets of

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license plates being ordered by the applicable initial fee for each set of license plates as set forth in subsection b. of section 1 of P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

3. This act shall take effect immediately, but shall remain inoperative until the first day of the 13th month following the date on which the conditions set forth in paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection c. of section 2 of this act have been satisfied. The chief administrator may take anticipatory actions in advance of that date as may be necessary for the timely implementation of this act. This act shall expire if the conditions set forth in paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection c. of section 2 of this act are not satisfied by the last day of the 12th month following enactment.

STATEMENT

This bill authorizes special Operation Desert Storm license plates. The license plate is to display the words and images that honor members of the military that served in Operation Desert Storm, which was a military operation to defend and expel Iraqi forces that invaded Kuwait. An application to obtain Operation Desert Storm license plates is to include satisfactory proof that the applicant served in Operation Desert Storm. In addition to the required motor vehicle registration fees, there is an application fee of \$50 and an annual renewal fee of \$10 for the Operation Desert Storm license plates. After deducting the cost to implement the license plates, the additional fees collected are to be deposited into the "Operation Desert Storm License Fund" and the funds are to be appropriated annually to the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs (department) for programs to benefit combat veterans.

The Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (commission) is required to annually certify the average cost of producing, issuing, renewing, and publicizing the availability of the specialty license plates. If the average cost per plate exceeds \$50 in two consecutive fiscal years, the chief administrator may discontinue the license plate program.

The bill provides that State or other public funds are not to be used by the commission for the initial cost to implement the Operation Desert Storm license plate program. The bill requires that an individual or entity designated by the department contribute non-public monies, not to exceed \$25,000, to offset the initial cost to design, produce, issue, and publicize the license plates and for any computer programming necessary to implement the program. The bill authorizes the department to receive funds from private sources to be used to offset the initial costs.

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The commission is not required to design, produce, issue, or publicize the availability of the license plates or make any necessary programming changes, until: (1) the individual or entity designated by the department has provided the commission with the money necessary to offset the initial costs incurred by the commission in establishing the license plate program; and (2) the liaison appointed by the department has provided the commission with a minimum of 500 completed applications for the license plates.

The provisions of the bill will remain inoperative until the first day of the 13th month following the date on which the money to offset the initial costs to establish the license plate program and a minimum of 500 applications are provided to the commission. The bill expires on the last day of the 12th month after enactment if sufficient applications and fees to offset the initial costs are not received by that date.
