#### SYNOPSIS

Condemns firearm manufacturers who produce firearms designed to look like toys.

1	A JOINT RESOLUTION condemning firearm manufacturers who
2	produce firearms designed to look like toys.
3	
4	WHEREAS, Firearms are dangerous in the hands of children, as
5	children can unintentionally cause harm to themselves and others
6	while playing with firearms; and
7	WHEREAS, Each year, almost 350 children under the age of 18 in the
8	United States mistakenly shoot themselves or someone else; and
9	WHEREAS, Children in the United States are killed with firearms at a
10	rate six to nine times higher than in other developed countries; and
11	WHEREAS, Although firearm laws are stricter in New Jersey than in
12	other states, New Jersey children are not immune from the effects
13	of firearm violence; and
14	WHEREAS, An average of 38 children die from firearm violence in
15	New Jersey annually, making firearm violence the third leading
16	cause of death among children in New Jersey; and
17	WHEREAS, Firearms that are not properly secured pose a greater risk
18	to children, especially if the firearm is designed to look like a toy;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, Approximately 4.6 million children in the United States
21	live in a home where at least one firearm is loaded and unlocked;
22	and
23	WHEREAS, The 4.6 million children who live in homes with unlocked
24	and loaded firearms are at higher risk for unintentionally harming
25	themselves and others with these firearms; and
26	WHEREAS, The risk of harm done by children playing with firearms
27	increases even more when the firearms are designed to look like
28	toys; and
29 20	WHEREAS, Firearm manufacturers that design a firearm covered in
30 21	colorful toy blocks make an already appealing firearm even more
31 32	enticing to children; and WHEREAS. Firzerry manufacturers across the United States should be
32 33	WHEREAS, Firearm manufacturers across the United States should be responsible in helping to prevent needless injuries and deaths
33 34	caused by children playing with and accidentally discharging
35	firearms, by refraining from producing firearms covered in
36	children's toys; and
37	WHEREAS, Nationally, firearm violence has increased since 2019,
38	making the protection of children from playing with firearms
39	designed to look like toys even more timely; and
40	WHEREAS, Protecting innocent children from accidentally harming
41	themselves or others with a firearm can be enhanced if firearm
42	manufacturers do not produce firearms that children will want to
43	play with; now, therefore,
44	
45	BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and General Assembly of the
46	State of New Jersey.

The Governor and the Legislature of the State of New Jersey
 condemn firearm manufacturers who produce firearms designed to
 look like toys.

2. Copies of this resolution as filed with the Secretary of State
shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly or the
Secretary of the Senate to the National Shooting Sports Foundation.

3. This joint resolution shall take effect immediately.

#### STATEMENT

14 This joint resolution condemns firearm manufacturers who 15 produce firearms designed to look like toys.

16 In the United States, children and those around them are injured and killed too often because of unintentional firearm violence 17 caused by children playing with firearms. A child in the United 18 States has a six to nine time higher risk of being killed with a 19 20 firearm than in other developed countries around the globe. Firearm manufacturers producing firearms that look like toys would 21 only exacerbate the existing problem. Designing a firearm to be 22 23 even more appealing to children than it already is would be grossly 24 irresponsible.

25 Children are naturally curious, so it is important that adults 26 protect them by not producing firearms that appear exciting, as it 27 could possibly entice them to handle household firearms. Building a firearm with modifications such as attaching colorful toy blocks to 28 29 the outside, would make an already curious child even more 30 intrigued. Firearm manufacturers across the United States should 31 recognize this and take responsibility in helping to protect the youth of America by not producing these firearms. 32

The time to act on this issue is now, as firearm violence has increased since 2019, putting children at higher risk. This resolution is not about restricting the rights of firearm manufacturers to design firearms the way they want, but rather is about protecting innocent children who may fall victim to a powerful firearm disguised as a toy.
