1	AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION celebrating the 50th anniversary of the
2	Center for American Women and Politics.

4	WHEREAS, Women have been involved in American politics since the
5	birth of the nation; and
6	WHEREAS, Women have been historically underrepresented in
7	positions of elective public office; and
8	WHEREAS, Increasing representation of women holding elective
9	public office will provide for a more representative democracy; and
10	WHEREAS, The Center for American Women and Politics was
11	founded in July 1971 by Dr. Ruth B. Mandel and Ida F.S.
12	Schmertz; and
13	WHEREAS, The center is housed in the Eagleton Institute of Politics at
14	Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey; and
15	WHEREAS, The center is a non-partisan institution that seeks to create
16	awareness and understanding of women's political participation in
17	American politics, and to educate women about public leadership,
18	training them in political and leadership skills; and
19	WHEREAS, The center convened the first national Forum for Women
20	State Legislators in 1983 in order to explore policy issues, the
21	future of women in legislative leadership, and the concerns of
22	women who hold elective public office; and
23	WHEREAS, The center established a National Information Bank on
24	Women in Public Office to serve as a clearinghouse for information
25	about women in public office; and
26	WHEREAS, The center conducted the first national census survey of
27	women serving in federal, state, and local offices, generating the
28	first accurate numbers of women officeholders in American
29	politics; and
30	WHEREAS, The center is a nationally and internationally recognized
31	source of scholarly research and current data about women in
32	politics in the United States; and
33	WHEREAS, The center seeks to promote greater knowledge and
34	understanding about the role of women in American politics,
35	enhance women's influence in public life, and expand the diversity
36	of women in politics and government; and
37	WHEREAS, The center offers many opportunities for education and
38	outreach through a variety of programs such as the Ready to Run,
39	New Leadership, and Teach a Girl to Lead programs; and
40	WHEREAS, The center has prepared thousands of women for increased
41	political engagement since the center was founded and continues to
42	champion greater opportunity, visibility, and representation for
43	women in politics; now, therefore

STATEMENT

13 This resolution celebrates the 50th anniversary of the Center for American Women and Politics. The center was founded by Dr. 14 15 Ruth B. Mandel and Ida F.S. Schmertz in July 1971. Though women have been involved in American politics since colonial 16 17 times, women have not always been able to hold elective public 18 office and have been historically underrepresented in public offices. When the center was founded in 1971, women held three percent of 19 20 all seats in Congress and today hold 27 percent of seats; however, 21 still far below 50 percent while making up more than half of the 22 American population.

The center is established within the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey. The center is a nonpartisan institution and has many programs aimed at research, education, and public engagement in order to increase representation of women in American politics.

The center is internationally recognized as a source of scholarly research and current data about women in politics in the United States. The center has sought to enhance women's influence in public life, and expand the diversity of women in politics and government. In order to further this goal, the center offers many opportunities for education and outreach such as the Ready to Run, New Leadership, and Teach a Girl to Lead programs.
